Hints On Good Grooming Given All Working Girls

TORONTO — Working girls across the country may get some helpful good grooming pointers from a program initiated by the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce.

At a luxuriously appointed Commerce Career Centre in Toronto new girls are told during a four-day course that it is important in their jobs with the bank that customers receive a favorable impression.

"Your personal appearance is one of your greatest assets," they are told. "Such attributes as intelligence, personality and good humor are underscored by an immaculate, well-groomed appearance."

How to achieve this? The bank recommends these essentials: a daily bath, the daily use of a deodorant; frequent use of a depilatory; frequent shampoo clean and neatly pressed clothes; conservatively styled shoes, polished and in good repair; neutral-shaded stockings worn at all times; hands smooth and well cared for with polish unchipped and not too brilliant in color.

Beauty expert Anne Balnaves, 26, a blonde from Sydney, Australia, is in charge of the make-up, good grooming and exercising course. Tall and attractive, she practices what she preaches, donning a yellow smock on the job. Longlashed she wears mascara, lipstick, a moisturizing cream and powder.

"You can wear all the cosmetic aids," said Anne. "The trick is to apply it correctly. The only item banned by the bank is the eyeliner because some girls do not know how to use it properly and others shouldn't use it at all because of the shape of their eyes."

As eye-make-up is being stressed for all age groups, Anne tells her pupils that eye shadow should never be obvious. "It is the illusion you create with an eyeshadow that is important," she said. "You apply it according to what type of eyes you
