

# IMPRESSIVE CEREMONIES IN CARDIGAN MARK CLOSING OF THE MARIAN YEAR

Solemn Mass, the blessing and dedication of the Marian Year archway and the impressive sermon climaxed the ceremonies of the Marian Year in All Saints' parish, Cardigan, Wednesday afternoon.

Prior to the Solemn Mass, which was offered by the pastor, Rev. J. P. E. O'Hanley, assisted by Rev. J. W. McCordie as deacon, and Rev. Nazaire Gallant as sub-deacon, the ceremony of the blessing of the Marian Year archway and the statues of the Blessed Virgin and St. Joseph was carried out by Rev. Owen Kiggins, pastor of the parish of St. James, Georgetown, and senior priest of the Upper River deanery.

Rev. J. G. MacCormac, pastor of St. Andrew's parish, delivered a most thought-provoking sermon on the occasion. Taking as the text of his masterful discourse the words of the encyclical Radiant Dawn of Glory, "honor and veneration which we give to our heavenly Mother undoubtedly returned to the glory of her Divine Son not only because all graces and all gifts, even the highest, flow from Him, but also because the glory of children is their father's glory." (Proverbs, XVII, 6).

He presented a most inspiring and eloquent exposition of the principal tenets of Catholic mariology, and paid glowing tribute to the people of Cardigan for their initiative, energy, and generosity in erecting a most beautiful and enduring monument to the Mother of God, which, he held, is the only tangible souvenir of the Marian Year in the parish of Charlottetown, and among the finest of its kind in Canada, and certainly a souvenir of merit and granite which will stand with edification to the hearts of your children's children as a token of your Heavenly Father's love.

The following is an English translation of the foregoing Latin text:

### "The Marian Year"

"In order that the radiant glory, with which Heaven wreathed the all-pure brow of the Blessed Virgin Mary might shine more brightly in this blessed Marian Year, which marks the centennial anniversary of the solemn definition of the Immaculate Conception of the Mother of God, we, the faithful and pastor of All Saints' parish, united with our brethren of the entire Catholic world, have recalled most lovingly to mind the singular privilege and mystery of the Blessed Virgin's immaculate conception and complete preservation from the hereditary taint of sin, and have given utterance, as best we could, to our common faith and to our common love of the Virgin Most Holy. Moreover, with grateful and joyful hearts, we have erected, under the leadership and supervision of John F. Rice, Esq., assisted by John F. Rice, Esq., Irving Roche and Harold Roche, a more-than-ordinary Marian monument to perpetuate the memory of this blessed year, and to prolong indefinitely our hymn of praise to Our Lady.

"Wherefore, mindful that never was it known that anyone who fled to the protection of our Heavenly Mother, implored her help, or sought her intercession, was left unaided, before the Father of mercies and God of all consolation, we invoke the most powerful patronage of the Queen of All Saints that our lives and the lives of all who belong to us may become divine, more and more conformed to Christ's commandments; and, in these our days, that mark the recent return of our young men from the field of battle, we hope that, through the favor and good offices of our most benign Mother, the dark clouds of war may disappear and the ends of the earth may be united by the rainbow of peace, and that at last the Church of God may enjoy throughout the whole world that freedom which is its right.

### Says Negroes Badly Used In England

LONDON (Reuters)—The mass circulation Daily Mirror Thursday accused Britons of treating Negroes badly and called for a change of outlook.

The 4,500,000 circulation, left-wing paper published an editorial, suggesting Britons "had better all think again" before they criticize the color bar in the United States. It cited a number of cases of color discrimination shown here recently to immigrants from the British West Indies.

The Mirror's new attack comes as the latest in a lengthy controversy which has grown up in Britain in recent months over the flood of Negro immigrants coming here from Britain's colonies attracted by full employment in Britain compared with economic depression at home.

As British subjects they have British passports and are therefore beyond immigration controls.

# Resolutions Adopted Yesterday At New Perth Farm Federation Meeting

The following are the resolutions adopted at the King's County Federation of Agriculture meeting yesterday afternoon:

1—Uniformity of Time Act. Whereas the intent and purposes of the "Uniformity of Time Act" would appear to have been thwarted by the action of certain towns in the province in unofficially adopting fast time, there be resolved that this meeting request our government to clarify its position with respect to the status of the Uniformity of Time Act.

2—Livestock on highways: Whereas there would appear to be no statute or regulation covering the responsibilities and privileges connected with the movement of livestock on hoof on our public roads, and whereas it would appear desirable to have definite regulations set up covering this matter, there be it resolved that the Federation of Agriculture draw to the attention of our government to the importance of this question.

3—Financial Responsibility: Whereas the number of motor vehicle accidents resulting in bodily injury or death to persons or damage to property has steadily increased during the last few years, and whereas many of these accidents involve financially irresponsible drivers and owners, there be it resolved that our government be requested to enact legislation providing for a financial responsibility law, as a protection to the public against the financially irresponsible driver.

4—Bounty on Racoons: Whereas racoons would appear to be increasing rapidly in numbers in the eastern part of the province, and whereas these animals are definitely more destructive than skunks or foxes, causing damage to growing crops such as grain and corn and breaking into poultry houses, and whereas climate and conditions would appear to be favorable to the racoon with no enemies to keep them in check, there be it re-

solved that this meeting urge upon the Department of Industry and Natural Resources the desirability of consideration being given to an increase in the bounty being paid for racoons, and a longer period being given each year.

4—Floor prices: Whereas farmers have in the past three years suffered a general decline in net income and this decline would have been more severe were it not for government assistance and price support and floor prices, and whereas this would apply particularly to the butter and to the dairy industry, therefore be it resolved that this meeting strongly urge the continuation of floor prices on butter at the 58 cent level in order that the butter producer may have some reasonable assurance of fair returns for his work.

5—Farm Implement Service: Whereas mechanization is playing an increasingly important part in agriculture and whereas machinery is increasing in size and cost and whereas it would appear to be a general condition that machinery companies and their agents do not provide sufficient service on new equipment, therefore be it resolved that this meeting go on record as being dissatisfied with the service generally provided by machinery agencies on new equipment and further suggest that all agencies give consideration to keeping open on Wednesday afternoons, their parts department, during cropping and harvest season.

6—Market information: Whereas it would appear desirable in the interest of potato producers that definite market information of an accurate nature be made available to the public, therefore be it resolved that this meeting urge the Potato Marketing Board to make such information available and to interpret such information in terms of what the farmer should receive.

7—Potato Board Members: Whereas the purpose of marketing legislation is to give producers a measure of control in the marketing of farm products and whereas it is suggested that such boards in other parts of Canada have demonstrated that producers and handlers or processors cannot work satisfactorily together on such boards, therefore be it resolved that this meeting request the executive council to amend the potato marketing statute to provide for a board of nine producers rather than six producers and four dealers, which is presently the case.

8—Whereas uncertainty has existed in the minds of the public relative to the position and the power of the Potato Marketing Board and whereas on Dec. 8th, Premier A. W. Matheson publicly announced his personal intention not to interfere with the potato board in the exercise of its legal powers and carrying out of its responsibilities, therefore be it resolved that this meeting express satisfaction upon the assurance above mentioned and further be it resolved that the thanks of this body be extended to Mr. Roland Macdonald, president of the P. E. I. Federation, for his interest in this matter.

9—Potato Board Policy: Whereas on Nov. 10 the plebiscite on the potato marketing question was against the central sales agency and favorable to the Potato Board and whereas a delegation of growers recently met the government and recommended certain changes which the government agreed to consider carefully, therefore be it resolved that this meeting request the government to make an early statement of policy with respect to the Potato Marketing Board and the scheme under which it operates and be it further resolved that this meeting request the provincial executive to wait on the government as soon as possible and obtain definite policy with respect to the Potato Board.

rich unique flavor of our product, and because our product was ready for marketing at an earlier time.

Mr. Ronald Macdonald, president of the Federation of Agriculture, gave a brief outline of the C. F. A. conference which he attended. He also spoke on organization and of the proposed potato growers association which was to be formed. He said that he was in favor of this provided that this group comprised all bonafide producers.

Mr. Macdonald went on to discuss the butter prices and stated that the Dairy Council of the Dominion of Canada was proposing the lowering of the price of butter below that of the subsidized 58 cents. He said that the council was formed mostly of processors and manufacturers who wished to lower the price, yet retain their own margin, and so reduce the return to the producer.

Mr. D. A. Macdonald, chairman of the Potato Marketing Board, commented on the recent plebiscite at which time the selling agency for marketing was voted out. He went on to present his views regarding potato prices, stating that prices in late October and early November were strong but at the present time were fluctuating. The unstable market arose from unorganized marketing, and shipping on consignment basis, he said. He regretted the variation in prices to Island producers at different points was again in prominence and said that it had reverted to the old way once more. The board, he said, would carry out its responsibilities of advertising, promotional work, disease control and all the other phases which would in any way help the producer.

Mr. Walter Shaw spoke eloquently of the marketing board system in vogue in Ontario, and illustrated his remarks with several examples. He also spoke with interest on the effect of potato goods and their consequent effect on producers' returns.

The following were appointed to the board of directors: James Howlett, Bear River; Frank Deagle, Souris West; Frank Connolly, Simonsville; Edward Sharkey, Corraville; Neil MacNeill, Little Sands and Mrs. Edward Goff, Woodville.

## Sees Canada-U.S. Friendship Firm

PARIS (Reuters) — Jean Desy, Canadian ambassador to France, said Thursday possible minor disputes between Canada and the United States could not weaken their friendship.

"The development of differences between Canada and the United States due to Canada's awareness of her growing importance should cause no surprise," Desy said in a luncheon address to the American Club of Paris. "This will not affect the fundamental friendship and agreement on basic issues between our two countries."

The ambassador said Canada's present Atlantic foreign policy had the widest possible support in the country—a country where the existence of two major languages and cultures introduced the possibility of "national schizophrenia" on important issues.

Desy said the presence of Canadian troops in Europe indicated his country's recognition of her "moral obligation to help defend freedom."

# PETER'S ROAD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH HOLDS 70th ANNIVERSARY SERVICES



Special re-opening services marked the 70th anniversary of the Peter's Road Presbyterian Church last Sunday. The picture of the church building, shown above, was taken on the occasion of the 50th anniversary in 1934.

The new foundation and beautifully re-decorated interior bear witness to the faithful work of the people and their minister, the Rev. M. C. Currie.

The services last Sunday were conducted by the Rev. D. A. Campbell of St. Andrew's Church, Montague, who in the morning preached on "Back to Bethel" from Genesis 35:1 and at the evening service chose as his subject "More Than Conquerors" based on Romans 8:37.

The choir under the direction of Mrs. Harry Butler was heard in the selections, "Praise Him" and "The Church in the Wildwood."

Mr. Bob Murray as soloist at both services sang, "Were You There?" and "Thou Remainest."

Messrs. Beas and Bruce of the Brooklyn Trio sang the hymn, "Marvellous Grace."

The flowers on the communion table were "in memory of father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Neil B. Johnston and sister Florence placed there by the family."

Despite unpleasant weather large crowds were in attendance especially in the evening when the church was filled.

Peter's Road is the associate congregation with Murray Harbour North under a joint session. The charge came into being on July 5, 1806, when Rev. James MacGregor of Pictou visited the island and preached two sermons in the home of Mr. James Irving, in what is now called Murray Harbour South. On the same date he preached one sermon in the home of Mr. William Graham, in the vicinity now known as Murray Harbour North.

The result of Rev. James MacGregor's visit has a long and interesting history. Two splendid charges gradually developed from these original services, and a long list of pioneers of our church have shared in the good work. Rev. James MacGregor is mentioned as the founder of the mission.

Following Rev. Mr. MacGregor is mentioned Rev. Robert Douglas, as a missionary from 1806 to 1830. Rev. Daniel McCurdy was the first minister inducted as pastor of the charge. He served as minister of the east end of the island from 1830 to March 6, 1834. Rev. Hugh Ross was inducted and took over the work in 1840. Rev. Neil Bethune was the minister in charge in 1850, but the dates of his induction and translation are not recorded. Rev. Neil MacKay was inducted Sept. 19, 1855, and Rev. Hugh McMillan, who followed, closed his ministry of the charge on May 9, 1866. Rev. Stephen Lawson was pastor of the charge from 1867 to 1876, and he was followed by Rev. Ernest Bayne from Jan. 18, 1876 to 1884.

As a result of the ministry of these early pioneers, churches were built in Murray Harbour North and Murray Harbour South. The churches are not recorded. But in 1882 or 1883 the Murray Harbour North congregation divided and the Murray Harbour North part of the congregation opened their new church in September, 1883, and the Peter's Road congregation opened their new church in July, 1884.

Seven years later, on Sept. 6, 1891, Murray Harbour South severed their connection with the above congregations, and since the above date, these two congregations have carried on the work as a single charge under the following ministers. Rev. Ernest Bayne was released in August, 1884. He was followed by Rev. Alexander Rouillon from Feb. 5, 1885, to June, 1891.

Since 1891 the following ministers have carried on the work of the church. Rev. Alexander King from Nov. 14, 1893, to Sept. 30, 1894. His

successor was Rev. John Cameron, from Aug. 21, 1895 to April 16, 1897, when he was called to his eternal home. His successor, Rev. John Gillis, was inducted Aug. 19, 1897, ministered to the congregation to Dec. 16, 1900. Rev. Dr. Macdonald as minister of the charge, served from Oct. 8, 1901, to Sept. 6, 1902. Rev. Andrew Gray was inducted Nov. 8, 1905 and closed his ministry of the charge on June 29, 1913.

He was followed by Rev. Archibald Sutherland, being inducted May 27, 1914, and was released March 14, 1920. Following him was Rev. J. S. McKay from April 28, 1921, to Oct. 31, 1923.

The congregation was vacant at the time of the disruption 1924, but the congregation decided to remain with the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and for several years they carried on the good work under supply, until in Sept. 1930, when Rev. Peter Watson Currie was inducted as minister of the charge. Mr. Currie's ministry ended in Oct. 25, 1931, and he was followed by Rev. J. H. Douglas who ministered to the congregations from Dec. 25, 1932 until Dec. 1, 1937. For the next seven years the work of the congregations continued to go forward, under supply. On May 16, 1945, the Rev. Charles D. Henderson was inducted into the pastoral charge of Murray Harbour North and Peter's Road and he served the congregation until August, 1950. He was followed by the present minister, Rev. M. Carl Currie, in October, 1952.

One hundred and forty-eight years ago, the congregation worshipped in a pioneer's cabin. Today the congregation worships in a beautiful edifice. And the associate congregation has a similar edifice and the addition of a Sabbath School Room. The churches stand as a monument of glory to the consecrated lives of the pioneer ministers of Christ in the vicinity.
