# House Rules Committee Facing Many Difficulties

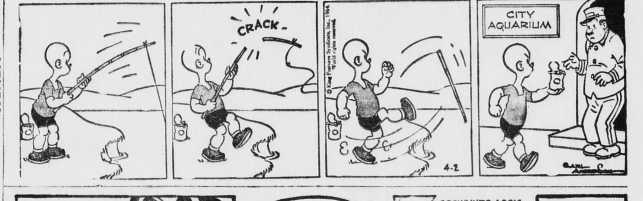
