THE Board of Health—Mayor Beer presiding—met this morning and visited several places in the city where nuisances were reported to exist. They went first to Pownal Wharf to witness the nuisance complained of by the Herald. Then they examined the sewer on Richmond Street leading from the jail to the River. The outlet of this sewer was blocked and the putrid matter was oozing out on the street. The Board decided to immediately clean Grafton Street sewer, and obtain the opinion of the Recorder as to whether it was the duty of the Local Government or the City Council to clean the sewer on Richmond Street and Government Pond. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) An Insult to the Papacy. LONDON, Aug. 7. The Liberal Government, it is said, offered certain considerations to the Vatican if they would appoint a prelate who would be acceptable to the Ministry as Archbishop of Dublin, in place of Cardinal McCabe, deceased. In the House of Commons to day, Mr. O'Brien said that it was evident those promises were never meant to be performed and the whole thing was a miserable intrigue. The Irish people regard the affair as an insult to the Papacy. Mr. Errington, who was in his seat during Mr. O'Brien's statement, replied that the document alluded to by the member for Malloy, was either forgery or genuine. If genuine, it had been obtained by some gross breach of honesty or honor, or that in either case it was not his duty to answer it, and thereby further Mr. O'Brien's purposes, and he would prefer to leave the weapons which Mr. O'Brien claimed to possess in his hands.

The Indian Budget. LONDON, Aug. 7. Lord Randolph Churchill introduced the Indian Budget in the House of Commons last evening. He announced a deficit of £1,029,000, which, he said, resulted in outlaying £461,000 more than the estimates, while the revenue decreased £568,000. A Difficulty Solved. DUBLIN, Aug. 7. The Earl of Carnarvon has solved the difficulty which grew out of the refusal of the Corporation of Limerick to pay for maintaining an extra body of police at that place, by withdrawing the extra body of police placed in that city.

Miners Rioting. LONDON, Aug. 7. The coal and iron miners of Ilkeston, in Derbyshire, have been rioting all day, and have already caused great damage to property in the parish. The Grant Monument. The New Minister of the Interior. OTTAWA, Aug. 7. Hon. Thomas White has entered upon his duties as Minister of the Interior. He will make a splendid official. Hon. Mr. McLellan. HALIFAX, Aug. 7. Hon. Mr. McLellan, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, arrived here yesterday.

Canon Farrar. OTTAWA, Aug. 7. Canon Farrar is expected in Canada in the middle of September. Telegraphic Notes. LONDON, Aug. 5.—Advices from Abyssinia say that Rasalula, with 5,000 troops, and Rasmarech, with 3,500 will attack the besiegers of Kassala at two points in October, and at the same time 1200 Indians and 800 Anglo-Egyptians will attack them at the third point. TORONTO, Aug. 5.—The cricket match, Canada vs United States, ended to-day in a grand victory for the Canadians by one of the smallest scores ever known on the cricket field. In their first innings Canada made 87 and the United States 43. In the second, Canada scored 57 and the United States team 62. Totals—Canada, 144; Americans, 105. LONDON, Aug. 5.—A despatch received this afternoon states that considerable excitement exists in Zanzibar, owing to a conflict being imminent between German colonists and the natives. The Germans are determined on punishing the natives for alleged aggressions and have enrolled themselves into military companies preparatory to giving battle to the latter.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—There has recently been a startling increase of outrages on girls of tender years. In a single day six miscreants were convicted at Liverpool, and other cases are reported elsewhere. The increase is attributed to the influence of the Pall Mall Gazette's recent exposure. The Gazette contends that there has been no increase, but that cases of outrages are simply brought into greater prominence. TORONTO, Aug. 5. Yesterday afternoon 27 half-breed prisoners, who participated in the troubles at Batoche, were arraigned at Regina on a charge of treason-felony. All pleaded guilty, and were held for sentence. Four were held in \$400 and their own recognizances to appear for sentence when called upon. It is believed they will be sentenced to short terms of imprisonment. To-day three more half-breed prisoners were arraigned, pleaded guilty, and were held for sentence. There is very little interest now manifested in these trials.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—At a banquet given by Cyrus W. Field, this evening, in celebration of the 27th anniversary of the completion of the first Atlantic cable, the following toasts were proposed by Mr. Field: The Queen, the President of the United States, The Illustrious Memory of Gen. Grant (this was drunk in silence), Success to the Atlantic Cables, may they perpetuate the peace, friendship and prosperity of the two great kindred nations. The toasts were responded to by Senator Hawley, Sir Daniel Gooch, Bart., M. P., Sir George Elliott, Bart., M. P., and Sir James Anderson.

The darker the plug the greater the moisture, and many prefer the dark. In each caddy, however, the preference for either can be met.
