

Aces Take Opening Game Of Intermediate "B" Series Championship Playoff

Summerside Aces took the first game of the intermediate "B" championship series from Milton Hornets to the tune of 10-6 in a fast played hard checking game at the Charlottetown Forum on Saturday night. The Summerside team showed better organization in their attack and their fast moving forwards were difficult for the Hornets to cope with.

The Hornets were in the game until the end of the second period but a five goal scoring spurge by the Aces in the third period gave the Summerside boys the decision by a six goal margin. Hornets scored the combination of their opponents and some sloppy clearing on the part of their defence paved the way for several of the Summerside goals.

Mooney Gallant who patrolled the right wing for the Aces collected the most points for his team by forming the hat trick and got assists on three others. Romaine got two goals and an assist while Harris, Taylor and Gay got singles. Pope gathered three points by virtue of three assists.

Milton was led by Gerald Cruwys with three goals. The smooth skating centre played a wonderful game for the leasers and when he got in on Milton's in the Summerside net, his marksmanship was deadly. H. MacLean was another Hornet player turned in a good game and was responsible for one of his team's goals. Andrews was the other goal getter for the Hornets with two markers to his credit.

The first period saw the Aces take a commanding lead to score three unanswered goals which were a result of poor clearing around the Milton goal. The Hornets took the initiative in the second period and before the Aces could get organized they had knotted the count with two goals by Cruwys and a single by Andrews. Cruwys' first goal was a picture. He took a pass from C. MacLean at centre ice, went around the lone Summerside defenceman, drew the goalie to score one of the nicest efforts seen in the Charlottetown rink.

Aces regained their composure about the three quarter mark of the period and two quick goals by Gay and Gallant put the Summerside boys two up. G. Cruwys brought his team within one goal of the Aces about two minutes before the end of the canto. The second period was decidedly Hornets' as they outshot and outscored their opponents 4-2.

Trailing 5-4 going into the third period the hopes of the Milton team were quickly dashed when Romaine scored at 1:49. Milton came back with a goal at 5:41 but the Aces finished out the period by scoring four more goals to one lone tally of their opponents. Gallant was responsible for two of these.

A total of 13 penalties were handed out by referees Richards and Goodwin. Hornets received eight while Aces were awarded five. There was a fair attendance of six or seven hundred people.

Montreal Canadiens In Second Place In N.H.L.

NEW YORK (AP)—Montreal Canadiens clinched second place in the National Hockey League race Sunday night by defeating New York Rangers 3-1 in the season's final game at Madison Square Garden. Paul Masnick scored the winning goal at 14:54 of the third period and Paul Mezer added another for Montreal with 10 seconds left to play.

The Canadiens will play Boston Bruins at Montreal Tuesday night in the first game of the best-of-seven opening round of the Stanley Cup playoffs.

Montreal nailed down the runner-up position largely on the efforts of rookie goalie Jacques Plante. The 25-year-old neophyte, who has been a sensation since he was recalled from Buffalo in mid-February, turned back 32 New York shots. At least 10 of them were tough ones.

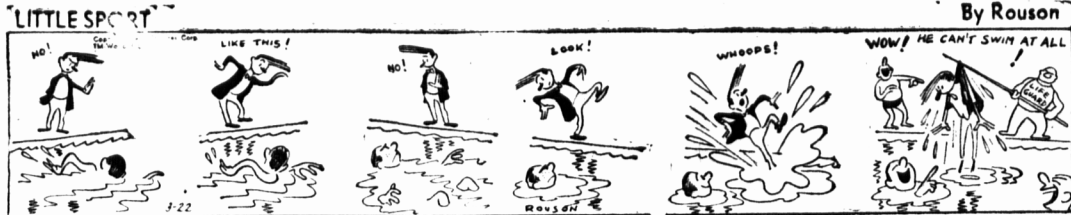

MMHL Finals Dates Not Decided

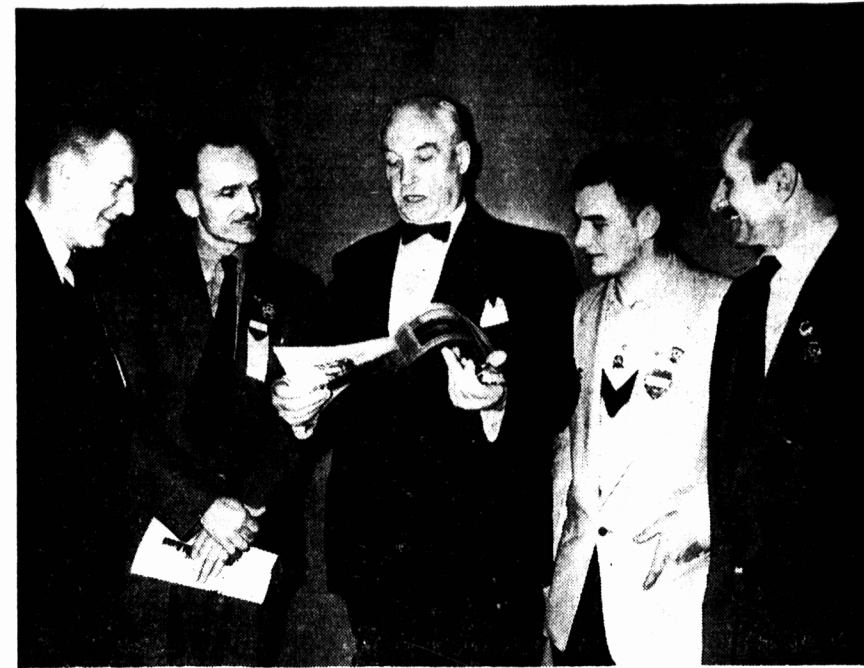

Fluke Goal Gives Harry Lumley Vezina Trophy

DETROIT, (AP)—Toronto goalie Harry Lumley gave up six goals Sunday night but won the Vezina trophy with a \$1,000 bonus from Terry Sawchuk of the Detroit Red Wings by a narrow margin of a fluke goal. Secondary in interest to the howling crowd of 13,203 was the game result which saw Detroit win 6-1.

The Toronto team wound up the season allowing 131 goals to 132 for Detroit, and their final margin was a blooding 80-foot shot by Jim Thomson which squirted through Sawchuk's legs in the second period.

Shortly after the start of the final period, Toronto, trailing 3-1, learned over the loud speaker that they had lost all chances of beating out Montreal for second place. It was announced that the Canadiens had defeated New York 3-1, thus clinching the National Hockey League's choice runner-up spot.

The only job left for the Leaf players was to hold off the Red Wings and assure Lumley of winning the Vezina trophy, which annually goes to the goalie on the team which allows the fewest goals.

But they almost didn't make it. Detroit staged a furious rally in the third period, scoring three times to pull Sawchuk with one goal of Lumley with seven minutes to play.

Those seven minutes were hectic, to say the least, as the Wings missed several great chances of scoring again. Action was further spiced by a hard-hitting fight between Gordie Howe of the Wings and Maple Leaf captain Ted Kennedy.

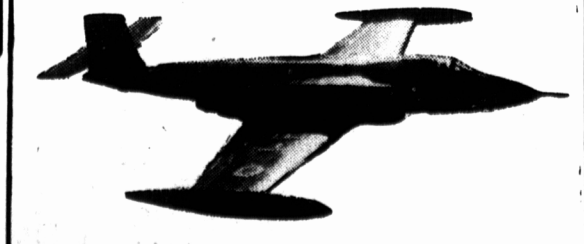
