is in charge of accommodations for the more than 500 delegates to the three-day Institute. Two speakers shared the spotlight at last night's session of the Liturgical Institute. Mother Chabanel, I.B.V.M., currently advisor on the secondary school level in the office of religious education for the Archdiocese of Toronto, addressed the delegates on "Liturgy and Catechetics". In showing the connection between liturgy and the communication and teaching of the Christian message, which is catechetics, Mother Chabanel made continued reference to the document of the Vatican Council concerning Divine Revelation, and urged that teachers

follow the example of the Council fathers in their approach to the Christian message. Mother Chabanel stressed that doctrinal affirmation is the container, not the content for the catechist's message to those he is teaching. The teacher must realize, she said, that his or her role in Christian education must be to educate in "yes-saying" and to be concerned with obstacles to this personal free response. Mother Chabanel holds a Master's degree in theology and is a graduate in catechetics from the University of Strasbourg, France. She is directing the institute's workshop on catechetics. Alan Frick, a liturgical consultant for a Canadian firm of designers is director of the Art and Architecture workshops held at the Liturgical Institute and spoke last night on the "Architectural Demands of Renewed Liturgy". Mr. Frick spoke of the cultural rebirth which Christian Art and Architecture is undergoing. A self-appraisal, he said, is now taking place to increase the impact of Christian culture which suffers now from "visible malnutrition". The Christian architect must help man to understand his time, Mr. Frick stated, and art from previous centuries will not produce 20th century man. The expression of the beliefs of each generation must be visible in art, and form or style must not be imposed. Sessions continue today with a morning session beginning at 9 o'clock. Workshops are on the agenda for the afternoon session.

## Centennial Performing Arts Program Is Discussed Here

Development of national and provincial program being co-ordinated for Centennial year was discussed yesterday at a joint meeting of Atlantic performing and visual arts officers for Centennial '67. The meetings, held in the government building, were under the chairmanship of Hon. Earle Hickey, provincial secretary. Attending the discussions were representatives from the Centennial Commission and Festival Canada Agency in Ottawa. Programs discussed included Festival Canada, with particular emphasis on the popular entertainment segment of this program for assistance to reduce ticket prices; visual arts projects; provincial participation in the spectacle on Parliament Hill to be staged by Sir Tyrone Guthrie next August, and other matters requiring provincial co-operation. In connection with the Centenary festivals of music, emphasis was placed on the need for schools to consult the special Centennial Syllabus, due in September, in preparation for provincial Centennial finals in Saint John, N.B., next July. Of special interest to Newfoundland delegates was the "isolated communities program" outlined at the meeting. Through this program, entertainment will be provided to outlying communities across the nation. In attendance were Nicholas Goldschmidt, chief, performing arts division, and Richard Grayburn, visual arts officer of the Centennial commission; Henry Wrong, director, Festival Canada Agency; Leo Bernache and Mary Webb of the Agency Staff; Col. G.D. Dailey, co-director, New Brunswick Centennial Administration; George Glannon, director of planning, Centennial year, and Nick Andrews of the Centennial staff, Newfoundland; Lester Page, Centennial Arts Officer and Mrs. Evelyn Garbary of the Centennial Arts Staff, Nova Scotia; Lorne Monkley, Deputy Provincial Secretary; Don Ross, Centennial Co-ordinator; Barry Bugden, Visual Arts Committee Chairman; and Ronald Irving, Performing Arts Committee Chairman, Prince Edward Island.

## Borden Ferries Set Monthly Record For Traffic In July

J.G. Davis, manager of CN's Maritime area, has announced that a 33 percent increase in passenger traffic during July over the same period last year has set a monthly record on Canadian National Prince Edward Island service. Last month CN used four ships to transport 185,348 passengers and 65,936 vehicles between Cape Tormentine, N.B., and Borden, P.E.I., 20,000 passengers and 7,000 vehicles more than the previous monthly record established in August, 1965. And if previous patterns are any guide, this month will be even busier than July. Although the published schedule calls for 38 crossings a day by three ships, CN has pressed its stand-by ferry, the Scotia II, into service and is operating four ships on as many as fifty crossings a day to keep abreast of the flood of visitors to Prince Edward Island. The bulk of the passengers—100,738—left Cape Tormentine for Borden. The number of vehicles inbound to the Island was more than 5,000 greater than that outbound. An analysis of the figures indicates new trends in travellers' habits and traffic patterns. The number of holidaymakers using trailers is increasing. In July, 1965, a total of 3,686 of these vehicles used the CN ferries. Last month the figure was up to 5,893—a jump of nearly sixty per cent. The number of motor cycles has more than tripled—from 44 to 149. The July total of trucks was down by 97 over the same period last year, but the number of tractor trailers was up by 196. Increases were also recorded in the number of people handled by CN's charter buses connecting with main line trains at Amherst.

## New Policing Arrangements Announced

An arrangement by which municipalities with a population between 1,500 and 15,000 may enter into independent contracts for the policing of the municipalities has been approved by the Executive Council. In making the announcement Premier Alex Campbell said that up until now the province has approved the contract arrangements by which municipalities under 1,500 persons may make arrangements for RCMP policing. Under these new arrangements, he said, no expenditures on the part of the province are involved.
