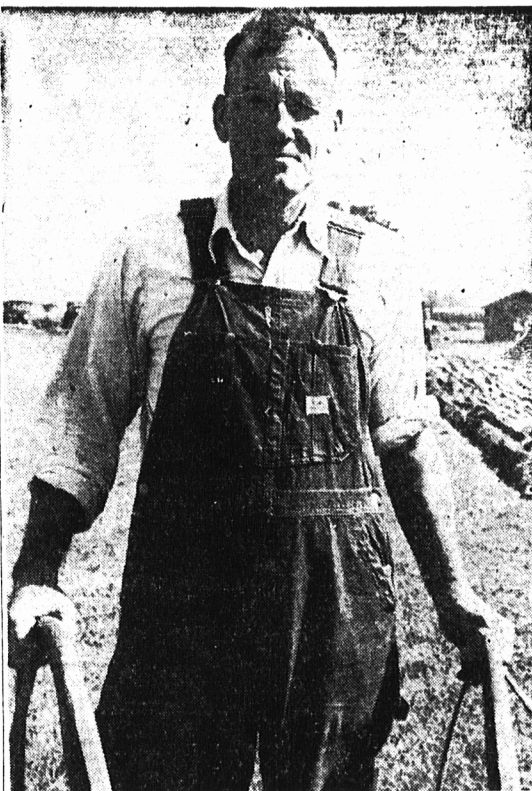

Increased Rail Freight Traffic To Province

A statement of carloads ferried between Cape Tormentine and Borden during the month of August shows an increase of 25 cars over the same period last year. 196 cars consisted of asphalt, paving aggregate and building material showing as in last year, went far towards explaining the increase. Other increases were coal 123 (12); fruits 11 (8); fertilizer 11 (6); gas and oils 206 (198); lime 57 (33); less carloads 259 (252); meats 14 (4); machinery 25 (17); sugar 26 (11). Declines were noted in livestock 1 (4); miscellaneous 48 (123); roofing 5 (30); brick and cement 25 (32).

A decrease in shipments from Borden to Tormentine of 184 cars, from 643 last year to 459 this year is due to the difference in rough-wood shipments which declined from 337 last year to 21. Other declines were eggs 2 (5); fish 1 (3); meats 18 (19); miscellaneous 3 (34). Increase were cans, empty 11 (0); livestock 84 (72); potatoes 119 (24); turnips 49 (25); machinery 11 (1); moss 10 (4); lumber 18 (5); trap iron 16 (12).
