Area Around Square May Be 'Toned Up'

Mayor A. Walthen Gaudet, said District Mortgage and Housing officials suggested during the recent executive meeting of the Community Planners Association of Canada that a study should be made of the effect on the downtown district of Memorial Centre.

Borden Council Plans Archway, Monument

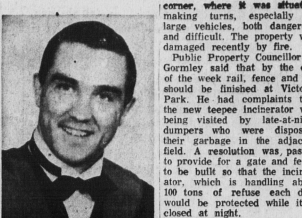

The Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges list more than 800 companies and aggregate value of shares which can be traded on the last amounts to more than \$50,000,000.

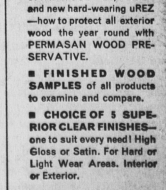
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
