THE Dominion Parliament meets to-day.

SHEEP.—At the meeting of the Provincial Farmers' Association, held at Sussex, N. B., on the 6th inst., the President read a telegram from the manager of the St. John & Maine Railway, saying that 11,000 sheep from P. E. Island had passed over that line last year into Maine; and that the United States drovers were preparing to largely increase that trade this year.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

VIENNA, Feb. 11.

It is reported that Russia has resolved to largely reinforce her fleet in the Pacific, with orders to cruise off the coast of China and Japan, and to keep a strict watch upon the fleets of other European powers.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 11.

The "Journal de St. Petersburg" says: "The resolution of Herat to Persia has been a traditional policy of Russia for the past half century. The cessation has always been opposed by England, who now abandons her former views of jealousy to Russia. The latter will not allow herself to be turned from the local rational policy she has hitherto pursued, which is backed upon her good relations with Persia; and if Persia despises her friendship, she does so at her own peril.

The *Golos* observes that the friendship of Russia is of vital necessity to Persia.

BERLIN, Feb. 11.

The North German *Gazette* draws attention to the attitude of the Irish Catholic members of the British Parliament. It says the matter has become serious, and a remedy must be sought against the proceedings of this party. This is regarded as an interesting reference to the attitude the Centre party of the German Parliament is expected to assume.

LONDON, Feb. 11.

It is reported in the lobby of the Commons that Baroness Burdette Coultts intends to give half a million pounds to afford permanent relief for Ireland.

The Grand Jury of the British Assizes returned a true bill for fraud and conspiracy against the directors and managers of the late West of England Bank.

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.

The appointments telegraphed yesterday as regards Mr. Wilmot and Mr. Boyd have been made and the former sworn in.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 11.

Several hundred unemployed workmen to-day demanded that the Central Pacific Railway discharge all Chinamen and employ whites, intimating trouble if the demand was not complied with.

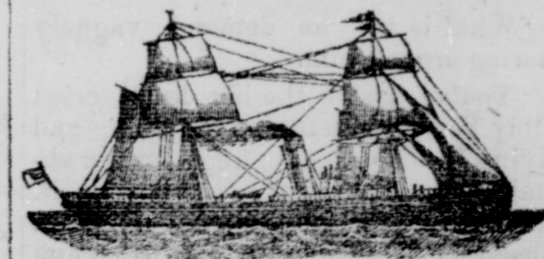

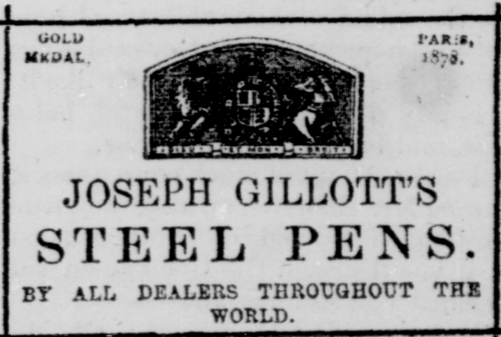
