Strange But True

Branding was a familiar court penalty in our country until about 1838. Deserters from the army were branded with the letter "D" and then deported. Other criminals were brought into court, then bound in irons, and a red-hot iron bearing a crown device was used to brand the palm of the prisoner's hand. The hot iron was applied to repeat the time the offender took the King.

The idea of Canada united with the United States is not a new brain-child. In fact, an annexation manifesto was issued at Montreal in 1849 calling for the union of both who was Canada's Prime Minister favored the move.
