CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:

West	North	East	South
1♣	1♦	Pass	?

What would you now bid with each of the following five hands?

- ♠ 88 ♥ 652 ♦ Q74 ♣ Q74
- ♠ 95 ♥ K98 ♦ K57 ♣ KQ842
- ♠ QJ7 ♥ K73 ♦ J84 ♣ AJ93
- ♠ J4 ♥ Q748 ♦ KQ98 ♣ 982
- ♠ 9 ♥ AJ7543 ♦ Q6 ♣ Q74

1. Two clubs. Partner's take-out double is presumably based on at least an opening bid. He may have 14 points, he may have 20 points—there is no way to know. Since partner is forcing us to bid, we cannot be held responsible for the absence of strength when we respond.

With identical values in diamonds and clubs, and a poor hand to boot, it is better to start at the bottom of the ladder in responding. If partner dislikes clubs, he has the opportunity to show diamonds in the two level. If our response were two diamonds, there would not be the corresponding opportunity to find clubs without going into the three level.

2. Three clubs. We cannot respond two clubs on this hand and also on the preceding hand and expect partner to know that this time we have a good hand opposite his informative double. The usual way to show strength is to make a jump response. In general, a jump response is

made with hands that contain 10 or more high card points. Where there are attractive distributional features, the requirements are loosened.

2. Two trump. Although the doubler is nearly always more interested in hearing a suit response, it is better in this hand to stress the flat distribution while identifying the high card values by the skip bid. Game in clubs is remote, compared to the possibility of game in notrump. The two notrump responses are generally based on 11 or 12 high-card points which include at least one stopper in the opponent's suit.

4. Two hearts. The strength is lacking to make a jump response, but there are enough high card values to allow for the possibility of game. Hearts are bid rather than diamonds, despite the difference in rank, because partner is more apt to bid again if there is a major suit game in prospect than if a minor suit is proposed as trump. Two hearts is an underbid in the sense that there are values beyond those usually held for a forced response.

5. Four hearts. Game is extremely likely opposite the take-out double, and since there is little doubt about the best suit to play in, the game is bid directly. There are only 9 high-card points, but lots of taking tricks. A heart fit is practically guaranteed by the informative double.

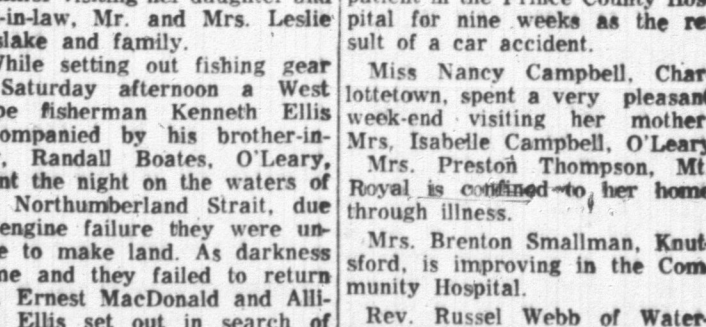

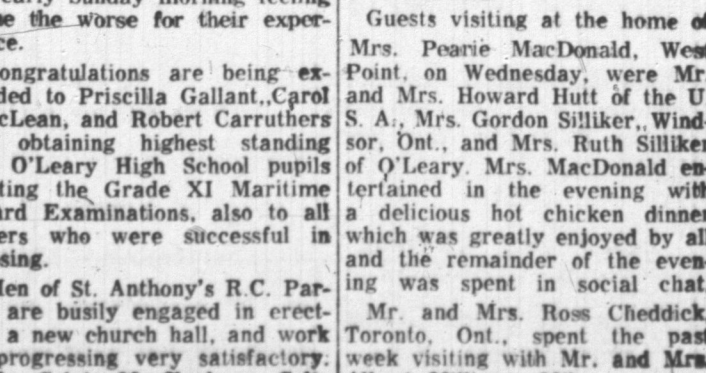
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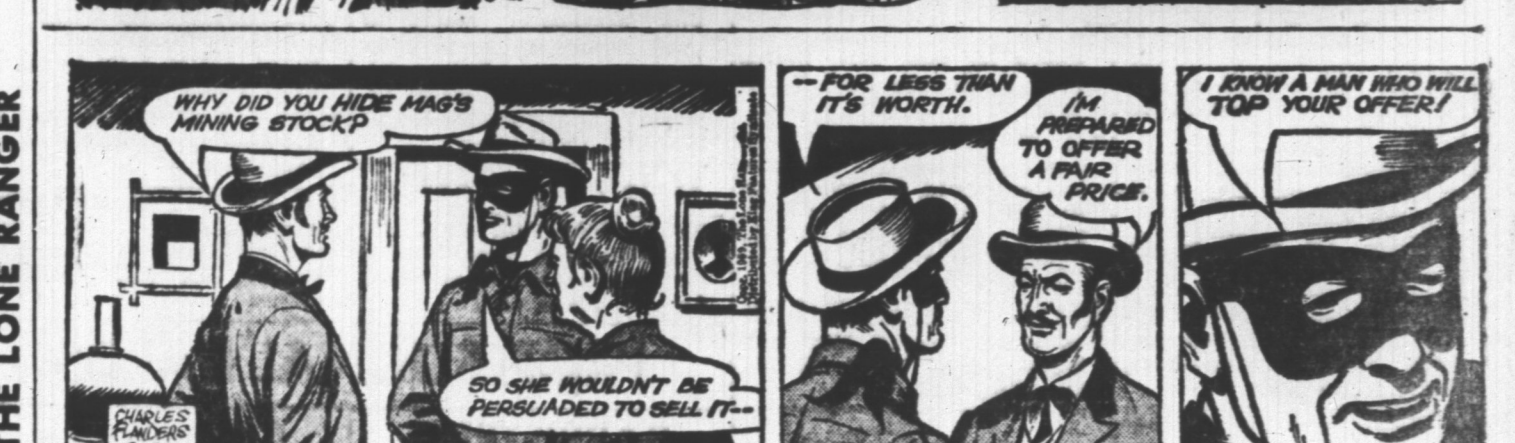
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
