MONDAY

Currie's Restaurant at O'Leary was broken into sometime Saturday night and a small sum of money stolen.

The Imperial Oil Company has been attempting to stage a Maritime Championship Plowing Match in connection with the annual match at Dundas, but as yet plans are still in the formative stage of development.

If the match can be promoted the company will send the winner to International Plowing Match in Ontario with all his expenses paid.

June Edith Kennedy, Harrowsmith, Ont., was sentenced Saturday morning at Georgetown to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary after pleading guilty to a charge of breaking and entry and theft which took place at the Montague 5 to \$1.00 store on May 1st.

The accused was arrested in Toronto last week. The case involved the theft of a cash box and approximately \$150.

The District Seven fall council meeting of the Klansmen Clubs of the Maritimes was held in Summerside, at Robson's Restaurant and Garden of the Gulf Auto Courts on Saturday.

Major Henry Wedge welcomed the visiting delegates and presented the District Governor Randy Reynolds with an engraved letter knife and the national president, Walthen Gaudet, with a silver dish, from the town of Summerside. Dave Carney, vice president, presided at this meeting.

In the afternoon the business session was concluded. Reports were received from all clubs represented and district Kin policy was established for the coming year.

At the Governor's Banquet held in the evening Club President, George Olskamp, presided. The District Governor was guest speaker and he chose as his topic the national Klansmen convention recently held in Vancouver. He commented on decisions and policies.

Miss Kathleen Herman, Assistant National Director of Junior Red Cross, arrived in Charlottetown last evening from Toronto and will spend this week in conference with the Director of Education, the School Supervisors, School Principals, High School pupils, Public Health officials and will visit a few rural schools. She will also address a meeting of the Charlottetown school teachers on Friday. Her itinerary while here has been planned by Miss Marie Bowmer, Director of the Prince Edward Island Junior Red Cross.

An exceptionally large number of candidates may seek nomination when the Liberals of the Queen's County hold their convention on Oct. 23 to select two men to contest the Federal riding in the next Dominion election. The sitting members, both Conservatives, are Messrs. Chester S. McLure and J. Angus MacLean.

Among the Liberal names rumored are those of Mr. Cecil Miller, former candidate; Mr. P. R. McCormack, President of the Queen's County Liberal Association; Mr. A. R. LePage, a candidate in the last Provincial election; Mr. Neil A. Matheson, editor of The Patriot; Mr. Chester E. Shaw, retired chief inspector in the Fruit and Vegetable Division of the Federal Department of Agriculture; Mr. Rollie MacDonald; Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways; and Mr. John Mustard, a former member of the Provincial Legislature.

"Taxes are certainly high these days in Canada," conceded the Hon. Douglas Abbott, Federal Finance Minister, in addressing the Maritimes Board of Trade dinner in Charlottetown last evening. "High as it is, however," the minister added, "our taxation burden is lower than in most other countries. It is the price we ourselves choose to pay for security against war and against social evils. I am inclined to think that we get better value than most for our money. Despite the day to day problems that are bound to arise in a dangerous and rapidly changing world, we can, I think, look to the future with growing confidence."

He said he would be happy to break even on this year's Federal budget, but held out the possibility of tax cuts if Canada's production keeps rising.

Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, Federal member of Parliament for Prince County, and parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, yesterday afternoon was re-nominated as Liberal candidate for Prince County in the next federal election. His was the only name proposed.

A highlight of the convention was brief addresses from Hon. Douglas C. Abbott, Minister of Finance; and Hon. J. Walter Jones, Premier of Prince Edward Island. The convention, held in the Regent Theatre, was represented by delegates from almost every political party in the province, including several members of the Provincial Legislature.

A 12-year-old Freetown boy, Francis Blanchard, was fatally injured yesterday when a truck driven by his father, Earl Blanchard, was in collision with another truck at Freetown.

The accident occurred about noon and the boy died about midnight last night in the Prince County Hospital. He had been admitted there at approximately 1:45 p.m.

Details of the accident were scanty. It was understood the father and son were employed by John and Colby Lewis in potato harvesting and were collecting potato pickers at noon. Apparently the accident occurred on the road or turning into a field.

Three men well known in Tignish have been named as Commissioners of the village in a Government proclamation issued yesterday bringing Tignish under the Village Service Act. The proclamation sets out the boundaries of the village and names the commissioners who will hold office until the first annual meeting. Under the Act this will be early in February.

Named as commissioners were Messrs John B. Myrick, Junior, Clarence Morrissey and Joseph T. Arsenault.

TUESDAY

This season's series of Prince of Wales College concerts opened auspiciously last evening with a delightful performance by the Halifax Symphonette, an ensemble from the Halifax Symphony Orchestra. Featured as piano soloist with this fine group of musicians was Mr. Howard Brown, of the Mount Allison Conservatory of Music. The ensemble was conducted by Mr. Alfred Stromberg, with Mr. Julius Silverman as concert-master.

Draggers fishing out of Souris have been landing plenty of flounders in the past few days. Yesterday (Monday) fifteen thousand pounds reached the filleting plant now in operation in the Eastern town. Passing through the hands of skilled filleters the fish were mechanically packed in attractive one pound cardboard containers. The mechanical wrapper was being used for the first time. It had just been installed.

Island householders will very likely become well acquainted with several kinds of filleted fish which will be marketed in these distinctive packages.

Rotarian W. J. P. MacMillan, M.D., O.B.E., of Charlottetown was the guest speaker yesterday at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Summerside Rotary Club.

In his address to the members, Dr. MacMillan outlined the work that the Charlottetown Rotary Club is doing in aid of crippled children and he stressed the need of the large amount of money required to carry on this work. He pointed out that in many cases these children have to be sent either to Halifax or to Montreal for treatment.

At a Little Theatre Guild executive meeting held last night emphasis was placed on the urgent need for more active members in the Guild. A large active membership would greatly reduce the difficulties of the Play Reading and Casting Committees because these Committees are limited in their efforts to provide worthwhile plays by two small number of actors, directors, and stage workers.

The Guild is pleased to announce that arrangements have been made to feature the story of the Charlottetown Little Theatre over the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation in the near future. The broadcast is being prepared and conducted by Mrs. J. A. Lawson. Further notice will be given when the date of the broadcast is known.

Miss Sybil Bennett, Q.C., who is touring the Maritime Provinces, was the guest of the Progressive Conservative Women's Association of Fifth Queens yesterday afternoon at a delightful reception at the Clover Club.

Miss Bennett, president of the Progressive Conservative Women's Association of Canada, and a relative of a former Conservative premier, Viscount R. B. Bennett, has received the nomination as Federal candidate for Halton, Ontario.

Three Island medical men, Dr. George Inman, Montague, Dr. L. G. Dewar, O'Leary and Dr. Angus MacLeod, Bonshaw, are now in New York taking refresher courses on cancer. They are at Memorial Centre Clinic for Cancer and Allied Diseases and during the month of October will observe the various types of tumors and learn the new techniques in the diagnosis and treatment of cancer.

A talk which ranged through a wide variety of connected subjects while never losing its main theme of aid for the development of Jamaica, West Indies, was given last night by Hon. Donald Sangster, M. H. R., Minister of Social Welfare for that Island and Deputy Leader of the Jamaica Labour Party.

He was addressing members attending the annual dinner of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade at the Charlottetown. It was the closing event in the three-day annual meeting of the Board.

Senor Jose Alvarez, Havana, Cuba, has arrived in Charlottetown to survey the potato marketing situation with a view to purchasing P. E. Island potatoes for his country.

Senor Alvarez is the representative of the Cuban Bank for the development of Agriculture and Industry and is accompanied to the Province by his wife. They will be here for several days. After he has examined the situation he will report to his principals and a decision will then be made as to whether to purchase potatoes for one of the farm organizations patronized by the bank.

Flying Officer Whelan of the R.C.A.F. Station Summerside, Liaison Officer for the local Cadets, made the pleasing announcement to the 80th Charlottetown Squadron last evening that they were to be taken on a flight next Sunday.

The 75 members of the Squadron are to be picked up at the Charlottetown airport in groups of 12 to remain in the air for approximately 45 minutes. During the flight each will be given an opportunity to "take over" for a couple of minutes to get the "feel" of the aircraft, as part of their training.

F/O Whelan stated that plans were being developed providing for a flight of this nature every two months.

The 7th Charlottetown Scout Group and Cubs were hosts to their parents at a cabaret dance in the recreation room of St. Paul's Parish Hall last evening. More than 150 took advantage of the opportunity to enjoy the evening's entertainment and encourage the Scouts and Cubs in their work.

Scoutmaster F. W. Jelks assisted by troop leaders Frank Mellish, Bill Ives and Lloyd White arranged the entertainment in which they were encouraged and supported by Mrs. Helen Duvar, representing the Ladies' Auxiliary of St. Paul's.

Wanda Chinery, three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Chinery, 150 Elm Ave., was struck by a southbound car on Elm Avenue at 4 p.m. yesterday, and received injuries reported as not severe. The car was driven by Mr. Thomas Dunn of Southport, accompanied by his wife and young daughter, the latter receiving minor injuries as her face crashed into and broke the windshield when her father applied the brakes.

Today, October 10th, marks the 20th anniversary of the laying of the corner stone of the present P. E. I. Hospital. The inscription on the stone reads as follows:

"The corner stone of this building—a house dedicated to the care and healing of the sick—was laid October 10th, 1932 A.D."

The corner stone was officially laid by Mrs. Taylor, widow of the late Dr. Evans P. Taylor, one of the founders of the first P. E. I. Hospital, in the presence of a large concourse of citizens of the City and Province.
