

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

HELL.—The Charlottetown Engineers will meet for drill tonight at 8 o'clock sharp.

SNOW IN MAINE.—There was a slight flurry of snow at Bangor, Me., on Monday afternoon.

THE PRESBYTERY OF P. E. ISLAND will meet in Zion church, Charlottetown, on Thursday, August 3rd, at 11 a. m.

NAVAL.—H. M. S. Partridge will arrive at Charlottetown on the 17th August and remain in port until the 20th.

A. O. H.—Special meeting this (Wednesday) evening, to consider the proposed picnic. A full attendance requested.

FROM BOSTON.—The steamer Carroll, Captain Hansen, arrived last night about half-past nine o'clock with a large general cargo and 117 passengers.

THE POLINO.—The steamer Polino, of the Dolell Line, arrived here last evening and is now loading with produce and cattle preparatory to sailing for St. John's, via Victoria, this evening.

THE ST. LAWRENCE.—The new shaft for the steamer St. Lawrence arrived from New Glasgow last evening. It will be put in position at once, and the steamer will be made ready to resume work with all possible despatch.

THE FASTNET.—The steamer Fastnet, Captain Churchill, arrived from Halifax early this morning, and left for Summerside at ten o'clock this forenoon. She will return to Charlottetown early tomorrow morning, and will leave here for Halifax at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

SCOTT ACT BOOM.—There is another boom in Scott Act matters in Moncton the fines collected this month so far amount to \$250. The petition asking for an election on repeal of the act in Westmorland has at last been completed and filed with the registrar, as required by law.

BOY FOUND.—The body of M. M. Bruce, one of the three Campbellton, N. B., men drowned last autumn, was found on the beach near Dalhousie on Monday. The head and part of one hand were gone. The store key was found in one of his pockets, and a Masonic breastpin led to the identification. The deceased was a brother of Mr. D. A. Bruce, of Charlottetown.

CHECK CATTLE.—Messrs. Blake Bros. received this forenoon from Mr. Alex. Irving, of China Point, four very choice fat cattle, the weights of which were: 1 cow, 1635; 1 steer, 1610; 1 steer, 1400; 1 steer, 1112 lbs. These cattle had been stall fed in the stable up to the present time and were sold at the handsome figure of 54 cents per lb. live weight. Ninety dollars for a cow is not so bad.

A VALUABLE YOUNGSTER.—On the morning of the 25th inst., the standard-bred mare Lucy Westlawn, by Westlawn, dam by All Right, dropped a beautiful colt by Parkside. This youngster is bred right. When one looks at the pedigree of Westlawn and All Right on the one side and the breeding of Parkside on the other, the conclusion must be reached that the owner, T. A. McLean, Esq., of Holland's Cove, has a colt with a great future before him.

MISCOUCHE TEA.—An immense number of people attended the Columbian tea party at Miscouche yesterday. Both the eastern and western sections of the Island were well represented, the Sorris Band accompanying the former contingent, and rendering selections throughout the afternoon. A large number went up from the city, arriving at noon. After passing a pleasant time, the return train left at six o'clock, and arrived in the city about ten. We have not heard the amount realized, but it must have been a grand sum.

SUDDEN DEATH.—We regret very much to hear of the sudden death of Captain John McLean, of this city, which occurred at Pictou yesterday afternoon on board his schooner, the Etoule du Matin. The body will be brought home for interment, arriving in the Princess of Wales this evening. The first intimation received of Mr. McLean's death was conveyed by telegraph to Captain Ronald McMillan about three o'clock yesterday afternoon. Mr. McLean was about 70 years of age, and was deservedly respected by all who knew him. He leaves a wife and family to mourn their loss.

PUBLIC MEETING.—A large and influential meeting was held at Kinkora Hall on Saturday night, for the purpose of electing delegates to attend the Liberal-Conservative Convention at Centreville on Thursday next. Mr. John Cunningham has occupied the chair. Although the evening was wet and very brief notice of the meeting had been given, it was thoroughly representative and one of the most enthusiastic held here for many years. Delegates from Newton and Kinkora were duly appointed, after which a discussion took place respecting the propriety of having a candidate selected for the eastern end of the district. Messrs. Peter Duffy, Thomas McCabe, Dr. Wall, John O'Riaghain, William Deighan, and Patrick Whelan spoke with earnestness and unanimity in favor of a Kinkora candidate. This proposition was endorsed by Mr. M. H. McCabe, Bedeque, and Mr. John T. Mullin, Kensington. This is the first time in the history of the Fourth District that the eastern end has put forward a claim for a candidate, and it was hoped by all that every section would cheerfully comply with the unanimous wish of their loyal Kinkora friends on this occasion. It was moved by Mr. Peter Duffy, seconded by Mr. Thomas McCabe, and supported by a chorus of voices, that the Hon. G. W. Bentley, Mr. Peter McCourt be the choice of the convention. The motion carried unanimously. Both these gentlemen thanked the meeting for the high compliment paid them, and in appropriate speeches expressed the opinion that the electors of the eastern end of the Fourth District would be treated by the convention as their well-known allegiance to the Liberal-Conservative party deserved.—Journal.

THE MINISTERS' VISIT.

Short and Pleasant Trip.

Stirring Speeches at Miscouche.

Their Arrival in Charlottetown.

Hon. Messrs. Angers and Foster and Mrs. Foster took passage in the steamship Northumberland yesterday at about one o'clock, and in two hours and five minutes were in Summerside. They were accompanied on the passage over by F. W. Hales and B. Rogers, Esqs. At Summerside they were received by Richard Hunt, Esq., and others, and at once proceeded to Miscouche, where they had the pleasure of meeting and addressing the large gathering assembled at the Tea Party in aid of the Miscouche Church. Among those by whom they were welcomed at Miscouche were the Rev. John A. McDonald, Rev. D. J. G. McDonald, David Rogers, M. P. P. John A. McDonald (Ex-Speaker), Neil McQuarrie (Stipendiary Magistrate of Summerside) W. A. Brennan, proprietor of the Journal; Gilbert DesRoches, P. T. Fanning, Neil Sinclair, C. B. McNeill, D. H. McDonald and other prominent gentlemen. After spending a pleasant hour at Miscouche, the party set out for Charlottetown in the private car of the Superintendent of the P. E. I. Railway, kindly placed at the Ministers' disposal by Mr. Unsworth. At Miscouche they were joined by Hon. Senator Howland and Hon. William Richards, and at Kensington and Emerald they were met by Messrs. D. Ferguson, F. Blake, W. E. Dawson, J. Unsworth, W. S. Stewart, W. L. Cotton and J. Heber Haslam. The fine appearance of the crops and the many evidences of thrift and prosperity on the part of the people were calculated to make a favorable impression upon the minds of the visitors. Arrived in Charlottetown, the Ministers were met by Hon. Senator McDonald, Hon. F. Brockton, and other gentlemen, and were at once driven to the Hotel Davies. This forenoon, the Ministers received a number of callers at their hotel as well as a deputation of the Western Farmers' Convention. A drive in the suburbs is being enjoyed this afternoon.

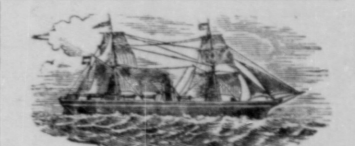
