Mrs. Rena Bryenton and Mrs. Eileen MacMillan were appointed leaders of Mission Band for current year.

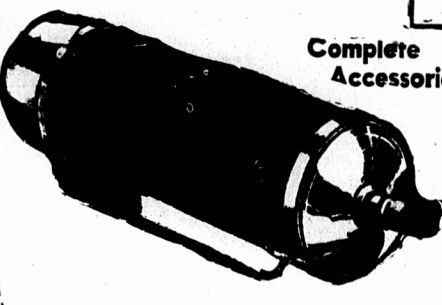
