Very Latest Telegrams.

London Sept. 6. The Times has a lengthy editorial on the subject of Mr. Johnson's speech at Sheffield, remarking the heterogeneity of the American people, and thinks the people of the United States are as much English as the people of England where the Irish, Scotch, French, and German make so large a share of the population. Referring incidentally to the general Elections soon to occur in England, the Times says: "whatever may be the result of these Elections, the same reciprocity of feeling between the United States and Great Britain is certain to ensue." Paris, 5th.—Lord Lyons gave a banquet to Lord Stanley, the English Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, who is at present in this City. M. Monnier was present. Speeches of a complimentary and pacific character were made, and much good feeling prevailed.—The Presse has an editorial to-day on the manner of the American Squadron in Turkish waters. It says that the demand that United States war vessels shall pass the Dardanelles is prompted by Russia, and that the Sultan is encouraged by the English and French Ambassadors will refuse to comply.

New York, 6th. Advice from Arkansas show fearful state of affairs there between whites and blacks. In Dallas County, Aug. 29th, a negro was accused of rape on a white girl named by the name of "The negro" was subsequently hanged for believing "riotous" about the matter. A general fight then took place, in which 5 whites and 7 blacks were killed.—Steamer advices report that the storm which prevailed on the south west coast of England Saturday night, Aug. 23d, proved very destructive to shipping. The beach at some points was literally strewn with wrecks of every description. Twenty-three lives were lost by the sinking of the ship Tara. Another large vessel, name unknown, went down off Forby light ship with all on board. Many disasters to British shipping are reported from the Welsh and Irish coasts. Steam communication with Ireland and the Continent was generally suspended by the gale.—Gold 147-8.

To the Public. A Defamatory report being circulated in this vicinity, which if allowed to go uncontroverted, would be of serious injury to the reputation of my family, I claim your indulgence while exposing the insidious and slanderous attempts of certain parties to bring their neighbors to infamy. Now, will any reasonable man affirm, that if the stick had struck with such effect as to cause the boys death, that it would not lame him, or break his leg, or leave some mark or bruise where it struck, but we find it produce none of these effects, nor was there any mark or symptom of inflammation in the parts said to be struck, during his whole illness. At first it appears there was only one blow received, but now a pain has arisen in the other knee, and Mr. McIntosh must account for it, or his plausible story will not be believed. Why? when the stick was flying it grazed the other knee, and hence the great pain in that knee also. But his arm, there is a pain in the elbow, how is that? Why, two years ago he was struck with a small stone, and although he never complained of it since, yet the pain in the other parts caused a pain there! The pains in the shoulder, other elbow and head are, accounted for in as plausible a manner as the rest. Did not he strike you there Willie, and there, and there? asks the father of a little boy who was in excruciating pains, and sometimes raving, as his father admits, and an affirmative question to his boy in this state has the desired effect. These silly grounds, along with the product of his imagination are sufficient for a man who I have always treated with the utmost kindness and respect, to circulate a tissue of infamous slander. There was but one blow given at first, and when any pain would arise subsequently in any part of the body, it was another blow given which Mr. McIntosh explained in his own good style and accounted for in this way. The evidence of my boys, the appearance of the child when sick, showing no marks or symptoms of being hurt, and the opinion of the Medical attendants, are sufficient to prove that the story was a slander, and that Mr. William McIntosh possesses the honors of that title. Why did Mr. McIntosh cause an investigation to be made, if he was informed of my desire for a thorough investigation of the case. No, for his plausible stories would not bear inspection, and he could not acquiesce his long cherished desire of giving it to them, knowing that in this case the slanderous story would be more effective. Now, in regard to my sanctioning improper conduct towards any person by my boys, I have not, but to the best of my ability I have shown them the way they should go, and endeavored to make them walk therein. I have not written this advertisement to abuse Mr. McIntosh, but to expose slander and hurt to him, and back to the author of it. This being accomplished my work is done, an infamous story is refuted, and its author is placed before the public in his proper character. The proverb of Solomon says—"He that hideth hatred with lying lips, and he that uttereth a slander is a fool."
