

# Lewisville Cubs In 5-1 Win Over C. And B. For N. B. - P. E. I. Junior Title

The Lewisville Cubs won their best-of-seven series from the Curran & Briggs Juniors by four games to one, defeating the Curranites at the Queen Elizabeth ball diamond yesterday afternoon by the score of 5-1 for their final victory and the N.B.-P.E.I. Junior Baseball Championship. The visitors got only three hits off the slants of Jack Kearns but five costly errors in the first two frames paved the way for the Curran & Briggs defeat. The Lewisville team scored their five runs in the first two innings, two in the first, and three in the second, but none of the runs were earned.

The Curran & Briggs team scored their lone tally in the fourth inning. Johnny Whalen hit a double to right, and went to third on the

shortstop's error. After Brian Lewis filed out to third, Coke Grady's infield out to shortstop scored Whalen.

After the fourth inning the pitchers had all the best of it, and no runner on either team got farther than second base.

Brian Lewis led the Curran & Briggs attack with two hits in four trips. McLennaghan was the leading stickler for Lewisville, hitting two for four.

The best fielding play of the game was Bourgeois' spectacular pickup of Cannon's smash through the middle in the fifth inning. Bourgeois went far to his left to scoop Cannon's first grounder and throw the C. & B. first sacker out at the initial sack.

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Hank Bauer, New York Yankees right-fielder whose triple in the first inning of the World Series Wednesday started things going for the Yankees against the Dodgers, blamed himself for letting George Shuba score a pinch-hit homer in the sixth.

"That homer was about a foot over me," said Bauer. "I think if I had got back in time and turned I might have got it."

In the end it didn't matter, and the Yankees tripped from the field sweating and happy.

Actually, Bauer made a tremendous jump in an effort to cut down Shuba's homer into the stands, but he missed, and Shuba went into the record books as only the third man in 30 years of World Series play to hit a pinch hit home run. The other two are both Yankees on the previous team: Yogi Berra and Johnny Mize.

## Savoie To Meet Carter In Title Bout At Montreal

**MONTREAL (CP)** — Armand Savoie, first Montreal-born fighter to get a crack at a world boxing championship, will meet lightweight champion Jimmy Carter of New York in the Montreal Forum Nov. 11.

Announcement of the title bout was made Wednesday by the Canadian Arena Company, operators of the Forum.

It will be the first world-title fight in Montreal since 1931 when Panama Al Brown defeated Eugene Huat of France for the bantam title.

Savoie holds a non-title decision over Carter, winning here in a 10-round bout last spring. But since then he has been shorn of his Canadian lightweight championship by Arthur King of Toronto and Philadelphia.

Terms of the agreement were not announced. Officially it was said Carter will get a guarantee of \$25,000 in addition to expenses, or 40 per cent of the net gate and Savoie will get a flat guarantee, probably around \$10,000.

Carter won the lightweight title May 21, 1951, knocking out Ike Williams in the 14th round at Madison Square Garden. He later lost it and regained it in fights with Lauro Salas. In recent non-title bouts he lost a decision in Miami to Johnny Cunningham and scored a technical eight-round knockout over Bryan Maloud in Johnstown, Pa. Savoie's more recent victims include Fabele Chavez in New Orleans and Eddie Compos in New York.

Both Carter and his manager, Willie Ketchum, expressed confidence that Carter will retain his title in the fight with Savoie.

"I know Armand is a real good fighter and I know he can hit," said Carter.

With manager Cliff Sowers nodding agreement, Savoie said: "This is the chance I have been looking for and I'll be ready."
