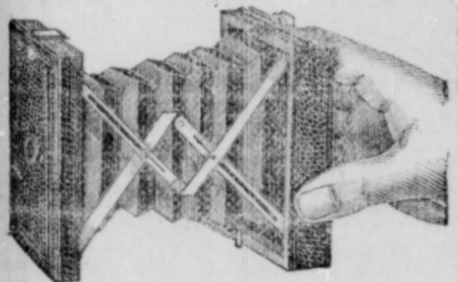

Information Wanted.

SIR,—I notice in yesterday's EXAMINER that it is the intention of the Government to increase the number of Stipendiary Magistrates in this Province and that provision is to be made that the combined salaries of the Magistrates in any one County is not to exceed the amount of salary now paid to one Stipendiary in the County. The salary of a County Stipendiary is now \$200 and if the Government is going to divide the sum among two or more of them in a county their salaries will be rather insignificant. But the Government is anxious to see some more of their Grit lawyers "out," as business is somewhat slack, I understand, in the legal profession. The inference is, lose and strong. The County Stipendiaries are making a fat haul out of their judicial positions, and the nominal salaries do not count for much. What about fines which our present Stipendiary Magistrates have imposed? Where do the fees go to? What do the Stipendiary Magistrates and their offices cost this country? Now whilst the House is in session let the Government explain in such a way that the public may understand the whole matter before appointing additional Stipendiaries as we know that the appointment of additional Stipendiary Magistrates means additional cost to the country.
