John Howard Society Annual Hears Reports

The largest and most represented meeting of the P.E.I. branch of the John Howard Society, was held last night at Prince of Wales College, with Matt Hagan presiding. Included among those attending were representatives of all welfare agencies in the province, all church denominations, police forces and interested citizens. One highlight of the session was the unanimous re-election of Mr. Hagan for another term as president, while another was the address by Mrs. Henry Wedge. She spoke on her experiences over a period of 18 years when she held the post of probation officer in the state of Massachusetts. Mrs. Wedge stressed problems and the juvenile delinquent, a subject which places a large number of the cities and towns throughout North America and many other countries of the world. In his report, Mr. Hagan outlined the work that had been accomplished during the year, paying particular thanks to the efforts of Wendell Mack and Clifford Orford.

Trusteeship Seen Good For Membership

Fourteen members of the crew of 18 carried by the ship yesterday lost 572 tons of flour yesterday. The SUI crew members left the walkout during the last two days of the strike. The ship's commander, Capt. R. C. Cutt, explained yesterday that the Lawrence's had been in Cleveland when the strike had begun, and the men had been ordered to return to work by the walk-out because she had been loading cargo at the time, and it was a two-day operation. Several of the union members, when interviewed, expressed their belief that their part in the strike was over. "Everybody likes to keep working," said an engineer, "but when the union decides on a walkout, you more or less have to go. The engineer pointed out that the Lawrence's was not really a strike — just a protest against the government trusteeship set up over the SUI. He said that he himself felt that the trusteeship would probably turn out to be a good thing for the union, in that it would bring about better government of it. The ship's cook said that he had been glad to return to working last night when the hotel accommodations and meals for the most part were excellent. But there was constant uncertainty with conflicting stories making the route about the progress of the union.

Cars Collide At Hampton

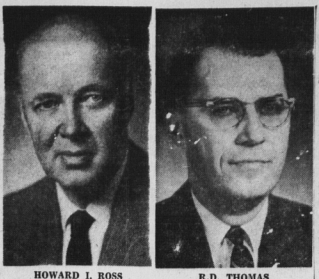
