This is a very controversial issue and very touchy subject for some people. I think the movie should be optional to students and no one should take that right away of anyone wishing to view it.

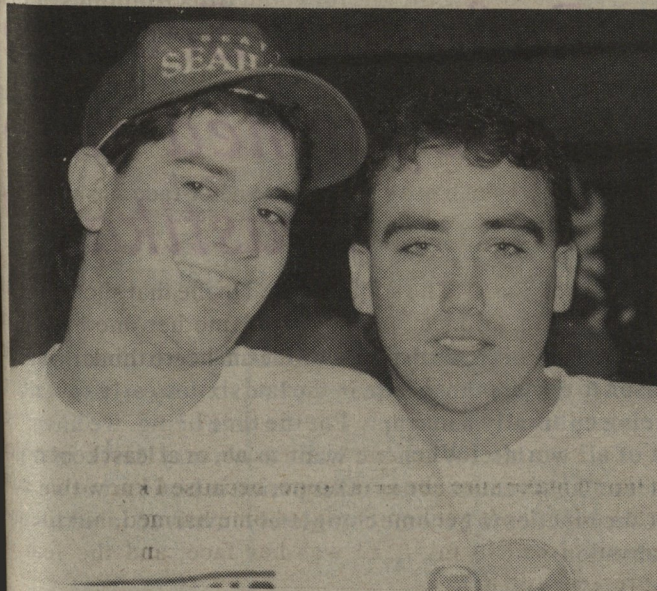
