

S'ide Air Cadets Get Promotions

SUMMERSIDE - Fifteen air cadets from No. 53 Summerside Squadron received their insignia badges last evening at a promotion parade held in RCAF Station Summerside with a large group of parents and friends present.

Prior to the promotion ceremony the squadron, including the bugle and drum band, was inspected by the commanding officer of the RCAF station, Group Capt. A. G. Dasg, who was accompanied by parade commander, Capt. Flight Sgt. Dale Mitchell, Sqdn. Ldr. Derek J. McLaughlin, liaison officer and the squadron's commanding officer, P. L. Charles.

The group captain complimented the cadets on their neat appearance and excellent turnout and also commended the parents for their interest in attending the parade. The commanding officer pointed out some revealing statistics which showed there have been 10,000 boys in the air cadet movement in Canada since the Second World War and 10,000 of these attended summer camp.

He added that cadets have supplied the RCAF with 40 per cent of the ground crew and all but 250 officer cadets have attended Royal Military College.

The group captain said there are 6,000 air cadets in Canada at present. He urged the boys to grasp the opportunities available to them through the air cadet movement and pointed out the value of attending training sessions and parades regularly.

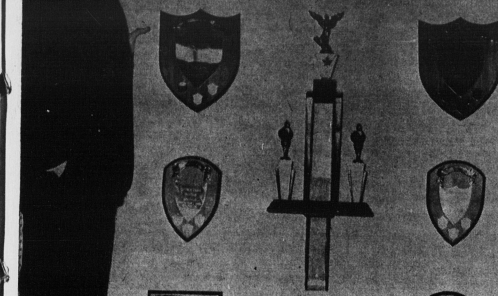
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BLOOD DONOR AWARDS

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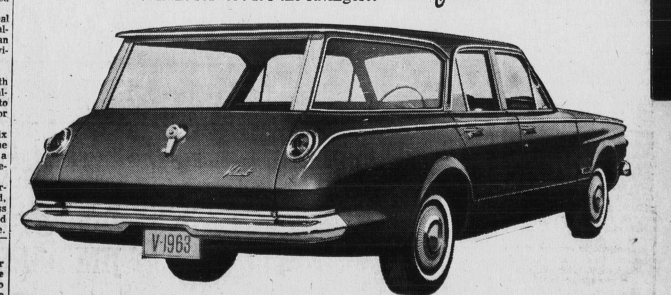
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
