C. N. R. Operating Revenues Up

MONTREAL, June 25 —(CP)—Operating revenues in May for the Canadian National System, all-inclusive, were announced today as \$38,358,000. Operating expenses were \$33,695,000, with net operating revenue of \$4,663,000.

In May, 1951, revenues were \$32,960,000, expenses \$47,832,000 and net operating revenue \$5,128,000.

The figures do not include such items as taxes, equipment rentals and fixed charges.

Aggregate net revenue for 1952 to the end of May was \$11,890,000 compared with \$14,716,000 for the same period in 1951, a decrease of \$2,826,000.
