**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

**LONDON, Dec. 2.**  
 The Prince of Wales has been nominated Grand Master of the English Free Masons for the seventh time.  
 Parnell, Bigger, J. D. Sullivan, Sexton and Dillon will each file an affidavit in the crown office, on which to ground an application for postponement of the traverse trial, as the day fixed for trial would interfere with their constitutional right to be present when Parliament met.  
**OTTAWA, Dec. 2.**  
 The Government are preparing a scheme for redeeming the five and six per cent. bonds with four per cents.  
 At Joliette to-day, Mr. Conville, Conservative, and Mr. Godin, Liberal, were nominated in Montmorency. Jann and Cloutier, both Conservatives, were nominated, and in North Oxford, Patnelo and Sutherland—both Liberals. The elections are not likely to result in political changes.  
**VIENNA, Dec. 2.**  
 Negotiations between the powers in regard to the recall of the international fleet are expected to be shortly concluded, the question was raised whether it would be advisable to keep up in some form or other the fleet as a visible sign of the concert of the powers in regard to other pending questions. But it does not seem to have met with much support and was immediately dropped.

THE Journal says, J. R. Elliot, Esq., of Elliot's Station shipped a few days ago to J. A. Bruce & Sons, seed merchants of Hamilton, Ont., twenty-two bags of seed wheat to be experimental with in above Province. Mr. Elliott, we understand, imports large quantities of seed wheat for the farmers in his neighborhood each year.  
 A SAD and fatal accident, which resulted in the death of Mr. William Farquharson, occurred near Southport on Thursday afternoon. Mr. Farquharson was in his barn, pulling fodder for his cattle from a loft about twelve feet high, when he fell backward to the ground floor and received fatal injuries. We are informed that the friends of Mr. Farquharson went to Pownal and there consulted a physician, who prescribed medicine for the relief of his injuries. After partaking of the medicine he found relief in a sleep from which he never awoke to consciousness. Mr. Farquharson was a man about 66 years of age. We learn that a post mortem examination will be held on the body to-day. The funeral will take place to-morrow (Saturday) afternoon at 2 o'clock.  
 THE brigantine *Hetty Ellen* loaded by Hon. Wm. Richards with oats, and which went aground off Indian Point on Sunday the 21st ult., was surveyed on Saturday last by Finlay McNeill, Esq., as Port Warden of Summerside Mr. John Ramsay, Shipbuilder, and Captain Albert Grady. The surveyors have ordered that the cargo be taken ashore and stored in the meantime, after which another survey will be made. They have, however, been able to report that the vessel is considerably strained, and is making water. Part of the oats are wet although the pumps are sufficient to keep the ship pretty dry.—S. Journal.  
 THE late gale did considerable damage in some parts of the country. At Sconcer, Lot 60, Mr. Stewart had his new house destroyed by the storm. Many barrack tops of the poor were overturned and the straw scattered to the winds over the country. At Newtown, Lot 53, Mr. Curran's barn broke down and destroyed two cows, disabled a horse, smashed a jaunty sleigh, and demolished his wheel hay rake.—At Murray Harbor Road Mr. Duncan Finlayson had the middle of the roof of his large barn taken away, leaving the ends with a few couples of rafters each and their portions of roof attached, remaining.—Presbyterian.  
 ON last Friday week at the Beach, Murray Harbor, Mr. John McLeod, master shipbuilder stood on an icy platform to water his horse at a well which was as narrow as the mouth of a barrel. In stooping to dip a bucketful from the water which filled up the well to within only eighteen inches from the top, he fell in headlong, his feet and legs tipping over the side of the well box and the impetus of the fall together with the whole weight of his body driving him down, he was jammed and held fast as if in the firm grasp of Death without being able to move his hands up to extricate himself, a short time afterwards was drowned in this position. He was an honest, kindhearted, cheerful man, much regretted by all who knew him.
