## P. E. I. Rink In 4-Way Tie For Fifth Place In High School 'Spiel

NELSON, B. C., Feb. 20 — (CP) — Alberta swept into the lead in the Canadian high school curling championships late today with its fifth straight victory, a 13-6 decision over Ontario.

Saskatchewan was knocked from the unbeaten ranks, falling 12-8 to British Columbia.

Quebec whizzed into a second-place tie with Saskatchewan by scoring its fourth win—10-5 triumph over Nova Scotia.

With its victory, B. C. took over fourth place from Ontario with three wins and two losses.

Grouped in a four-way tie for fifth place were Prince Edward Island, Ontario, Northern Ontario and Manitoba.

Northern Ontario defeated P. E. I. 9-7 in today's afternoon matches and Manitoba slaughtered winless New Brunswick four 17-0.

In morning matches, Saskatchewan defeated Manitoba 12-6; Alberta defeated P. E. I. 8-4; Quebec defeated B. C. 10-7; Ontario defeated N. B. 12-6; and Northern Ontario whipped Nova Scotia 12-6.

Sixth round of the nine-round tournament is to be played tonight.

## Fines Announced By President Of Big Four League

HALIFAX, Feb. 20 — (CP) — Coach Leo Lamoureux of Charlottetown Islanders of the Maritime Major Hockey League was fined \$25 today for grabbing a referee at the penalty box during a game with Halifax at Charlottetown Feb. 8.

Judge J. Elliott Hudson, League president, said he had also told Lamoureux to make a retraction of a statement attributed to him Feb. 9 when Islanders' bus was stolen in Halifax.

Newspapers at that time quoted Lamoureux as saying: "Here we have been flying to all Halifax games. And the one time we charter a bus, somebody goes and steals it. They'd steal anything from the Islanders here. Referees have been doing it all along in the Big Four games. Now it's our bus." (Lamoureux issued a statement last night saying his remarks were made in a jesting mood and that he did not mean to cast reflection on the referees of the league.)

Judge Hudson said he had told Lamoureux that, if the statement had not been made "further action would be taken."

## Walter Pawlyshyn Got Islanders Opening Tally At 10:26

Walter Pawlyshyn got Islanders opening tally at 10:26 on a beautiful solo effort from behind his own blue line after Bucko Trainor had sent him in the clear with a smart pass. Pawlyshyn tore down the ice with only Lorne Smith back, worked his way around the big defencemen, to go in and fire home the disc from a hard angle that caught the open, right-hand corner of the net. The marker fired the Islanders to a whirlwind effort in the next minute and 27 seconds of play. Johnny Horeck came roaring back with brother Danny and Hub Beaudry just 44 seconds later on a smart 3-man attack to net his first of four goals on the night's play. Johnny got his second on a smart solo 43 seconds later. While Johnny Dutchak was serving a major for fighting and George McLagan a minor for elbowing, Larry Dunville fired Moncton's lone tally with a hard, screened shot from just inside Islanders' blue line during a Hawks' gang attack. Mousing Dowling fed the big Moncton defenceman the payoff pass, the goal coming at the 19:14 mark.

Early in the second period, Jack Morrow teamed up with Larry Travis and Trainor to send the Islanders out in front 4-1. Morrow tipping in a long, screened shot by Travis from the blue line, Trainor setting up the play with a long pass during a hammering attack inside the Moncton blue line. The goal came at 4:45, and at 4:42, Islanders high-flying left winger Johnny Horeck put locals in front by five goals and garnered his third of the night. Plopping up a loose puck just outside his own blue line, Danny Horeck broke down the ice with Beaudry and Johnny. Hitting the red line, Danny slipped a pass to Beaudry who carried it over the blue line to go right in before slipping a pass to Johnny who came roaring in off left wing to drive home the puck that beat Colvin cleanly. Johnny got his fourth at 5:07 on a power attack around the net with Beaudry and Danny again.

From then on things roughened up considerably, with little Frank "Jodine" Imonti starting the ball rolling when he charged Marcel Clements into the boards head first that took six stitches to sew up a bad gash around his mouth.
