Word was received recently by Charles S. MacKay of Kensington that his cousin, Henry E. MacKay of Okotoks, Alberta had passed away on June 15, following an operation in a Calgary hospital in his 80th year.

The late Mr. MacKay was born in Darnley Lot 18, son of Archibald and Elizabeth MacKay.

In 1901 he went west and homesteaded in Nanton, Alta., where he was one of the pioneer settlers and where he engaged in farming for quite a number of years. Later he moved to Okotoks, where he has since resided.

In the year 1904 he married Bertha Pickering, formerly of Clinton, P. E. I., and in September of last year the couple celebrated the 50th anniversary of their marriage.

In politics, deceased was one of the stalwart liberals of Alberta and a close personal friend of the late Senator Dan Riley, also a former Islander.

He leaves to mourn his passing, his widow, one son John T. of Peru, South America, and one daughter, Helen, at home; also two sisters, Mrs. Christy Stophor, San Diego, California and Mrs. Mary J. MacKay Freeland Lot 11, P. E. I.
