## A WARLIKE SITUATION.

London Times on the Issue.

### Great Britain Will Fight for Her Rights in China and West Africa

IF THEY ARE NOT YIELDED PEACE-  
FULLY.

Probable Alliance of United States,  
Great Britain and Japan.

LONDON, March 11.—The Times regards  
the news from Peking as unassuring. It  
says: "An interval may occur during  
which diplomatic means may be employed  
to avert ill-considered actions on the part  
of our rivals. If a delay of any duration  
has been actually procured, Sir Claude  
MacDonald, the British minister, may be  
relied upon to make the most of it in the  
interests of peace. In other respects the  
position in China seems as far from im-  
provement as the position in West Africa.  
If the report from St. Petersburg that  
Russia will decline to give Great Britain  
the information she has asked is correct,  
the nation cannot be blamed should they  
put the worst possible construction on the  
refusal. Those most familiar with  
public opinion throughout the country  
will be the first to recognize  
that the present temper of the people is not  
to be trifled with. At no time since the  
Crimean war have they been less disposed  
to brook infringements from any quarter  
on their just rights. They are perfectly con-  
vinced of the justice of their cause and the  
magnitude of the issues at stake, both in  
China and West Africa. They believe it  
may become their duty to vindicate that  
cause in either region, and if such a duty  
should be thrown upon them by the blun-  
ders or perversity of others, they will not  
flinch from it. We do not make this  
assertion in any spirit of bravado or from  
any desire to rouse the warlike feeling of  
the country. We make it in the true in-  
terests of peace, because the greatest  
menace to peace lies in the danger that  
our rivals may fall to believe that we are  
in earnest until it is too late. Foreigners  
do not appear to realize the business view  
we take of war, as of other matters, where  
our business interests are concerned. Our  
conduct is regulated mainly by business  
considerations. If the prejudice done us  
is slight we may resent this yet pass it over  
rather than face serious losses, which, as  
we well know, war must, at the best, involve  
to our trade. But if the prejudice done  
is threatened is very grave and irreparable,  
we are ready, of the two great evils, to  
choose war as the least."

The London correspondent of The Daily  
Telegraph says: "I have it on the  
highest authority that a triple alliance be-  
tween Great Britain and the United States  
and Japan is pending."

# PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

## Yukon Deal Carried in the Commons.

GOVERNMENT MAJORITY, 39.

### Four Liberals Voted With the Opposition.

OTTAWA, March 11.—The House of  
Commons divided on the Yukon bill at  
4:30 o'clock this morning.  
The Opposition amendment was lost by  
a vote of 65 yeas to 110 nays. Messrs  
Costigan, Hale, Bethune and Hughes vot-  
ing with the Government. A vote was  
then taken on the main motion which was  
carried by a vote of one hundred and eleven  
yeas to 72 nays.  
Messrs. Hughes and Bethune, Conserva-  
tive, voting with the Government, while  
McLennan, O'Brien, Rogers and Erb, Liberal,  
voted with the Opposition. Mr. Casey  
escaped the vote—Messrs. Costigan and  
Hale voted "nay" on both motions.

**NEWS NOTES.**

The 1897 drink bill of the United King-  
dom was £3,500,000 greater last year than  
in 1896.  
Japan is about to float a new loan of a  
150,000,000 yen. If in gold this would  
amount to practically \$150,000,000, but  
if in silver to only 75,000,000. The loan  
will probably be floated in London.  
The London Saturday Review insinuates  
that the attempt to assassinate King  
George of Greece last week was arranged  
with the idea of arousing a revulsion of  
popular feeling in favor of the dynasty.  
The total number of war vessels now in  
course of construction for Great  
Britain includes 12 battleships,  
16 first-class cruisers, six second-  
class cruisers, ten third-class cruisers, six  
sloops of war, four twin screw gunboats,  
and 41 torpedo boat destroyers.  
The coalition suggestion is being sharply  
condemned by the Ontario Conserva-  
tive press. The sign is a good one. Co-  
alitions, when no great object is to be won,  
only divide the responsibility for mistakes  
and wrong doing. Better another election  
than a coalition.

Truth says the topical picture now sold  
in the streets of London is a portrait of Mr.  
Joseph Chamberlain. Hanging out of  
one of his pockets is a small strip of card,  
and under the picture are the words "Find  
Lord Salisbury." You pull the card  
board strip and a small sketch of the  
Prime Minister comes out of Mr. Cham-  
berlain's pocket.

In the famous Prabyody model tenement,  
the London Daily News says there  
is a population of no less than seven hun-  
dred and twenty-five to an acre, yet the  
birth rate is five in one thousand above  
the average rate, and infant mortality is  
twenty-two in one thousand below the  
average. At this rate the population will  
soon grow faster than the profits of the  
trust, which were last year \$210,000.

Three sets of statistics in the Govern-  
ment reports point clearly to a steady  
growth of prosperity in Ireland. They  
show that emigration is rapidly decreasing  
and the amount of money in the savings  
bank is greater than ever before. They  
also show that evictions and outrages are  
becoming less numerous. Of the total  
number of emigrants last year the United  
States got more than 88 per cent.

The polar expedition upon which the  
Italian Duke of Abruzzi will start this  
summer will be both expensive and exten-  
sive. King Humbert contributes \$100,000,  
the Duke devotes his whole income of  
\$30,000 a year to the object, and if neces-  
sary also will draw upon his capital. After  
leaving Franz Josef Land on foot or in  
sleds they will establish posts along the  
route. The Duke takes twenty experienced  
Italians, fifty Esquimaux and a number of  
dogs.

The surprise which was created at the  
time of Prince Henry's visit, when the  
German warships Deutschland and Gefion  
suddenly loomed out of the fog without  
having previously been sighted, has aroused  
the authorities to a sense of the necessity  
of taking additional precautions, and they  
are now erecting quick firing guns and  
searchlights. At the entrance of Ports-  
mouth harbor there will be a light powerful  
enough to sweep Spithead, and guns will  
be so placed that ships entering must pass  
under their muzzles.

The Touquay gold mining company of  
Nova Scotia took \$28,000 worth of gold  
out of their mine during the past ten  
months and they are now installing an air  
compressor plant, so as to still further  
increase their profits.

Emperor William is to visit Palestine in  
October next, his object being to determine  
for himself the exact sites of Golgotha, the  
Temple of Jerusalem, and the place of the  
Crucifixion.

Up to the present, eleven Presbyteries  
have nominated Rev. Dr. Bryce, of  
Winnipeg, as moderator of the general  
assembly, which meets in Montreal next  
June.

The London Morning Post says it hears  
on good authority that the bounty-giving  
powers are anxious to abolish bounties,  
and are willing to meet in conference in  
London and to adopt the convention of  
1888, or, as an alternative, to accept the  
imposition of countervailing duties.

Mr. Gladstone's health continues to  
improve in the sunshine of the South  
coast at Bournemouth. His daughter  
reports him infinitely more vigorous in  
movements than for some time. His voice  
is strong and clear, and his mental capacity  
for work as keen as ever. According to  
the Westminster Gazette, however, Mr.  
Gladstone has stopped work. His friends  
read to him, play for him and favor him  
with many visits.

The British Admiralty has ordered the  
prompt delivery at Portsmouth of ten  
twelve inch guns and 24 six inch firing  
guns of a new pattern, the special features  
of which are their breech mechanism and  
a new apparatus for working the primers.  
The new guns work wholly automatically,  
and at their firing trials, they gave the  
greatest satisfaction, the round taking only  
6 1/2 seconds and eight rounds being fired in  
86 seconds. They have a stringing power  
of 5,374 foot tons against 3,241 attainable  
by the present guns. The officials there  
assert that these are the best results  
obtained by any naval power.
