They report fish scarce outside but plentiful inside the limit. They would hail with pleasure a settlement of the question that would give them the coveted privilege of fishing where they pleased.

THE BISHOPRIC.

A DEADLOCK.

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 10. There is a deadlock in the selection of a Bishop, though three ballots have been taken. There was a conference this afternoon, at which 20 laymen and 20 clerical delegates were selected, but they had not been able to agree on any course to recommend to the house when the Synod met to-night. A further adjournment took place to allow the friends of each candidate to instruct their representatives at the conference. After the first ballot Rev. Mr. Snyder nominated Bishop Perry, of Iowa, and Mr. Rowley nominated Canon Brigstocke, of Trinity Church. There are 115 lay and 79 clerical delegates present. The ballots were: FIRST BALLOT.—Clerical, Archdeacon Gilpin, 53; Dr. Sullivan, 23. Lay, Archdeacon Gilpin, 38, and Dr. Sullivan 77. SECOND BALLOT.—Clerical, Sullivan, 20; Gilpin, 48; Perry, 8. Lay, Sullivan, 77; Gilpin, 34; Perry, 7. THIRD BALLOT.—Clerical, Gilpin, 44; Sullivan, 18, and Perry, 3. Lay, Sullivan, 74; Gilpin, 40, and Perry, 1. The Bishop of Illinois and the Bishop of Quebec are both here and addressed the Synod. At 9 p. m., the Synod adjourned till 10 o'clock to-morrow morning.

LATER. HALIFAX, Aug. 11. The Synod has elected Bishop Perry, of Iowa, Bishop of Nova Scotia. The new Bishop-elect is well elect is well known as a particularly able man, and this Diocese will be fortunate if he accepts. [Bishop Perry visited Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island last year, and delivered several sermons and addresses.]

Lord Mayor's Banquet. LONDON, Aug. 10. The Lord Mayor's annual banquet to the ministers was given at the Mansion House this evening. Premier Salisbury, in a speech, said the Government had done everything to give effect to the country's mandate, so as to preserve the unity of the Empire. The extra Powers had been placed at the Government's command. The country had a right to complain of the powers were used indiscreetly, but they would be applied firmly. This is believed to signify that the Government will proclaim the Irish National League. Regarding Egypt the Premier said England must see real security in that country, so that before the British troops were withdrawn Egypt must be free from internal sedition and safe from external attacks.

The J. H. G. Perkins Matter. OTTAWA, Aug. 11. The Government have decided not to proceed for the condemnation of the schooner J. H. G. Perkins seized at Souris, Prince Edward Island, but instead will proceed against the captain personally for penalties. It is said that instructions to this effect have been sent to the officials on the Island. [Upon enquiries we learn that the schooner has not yet been released.]

The C. P. R. MONTREAL, Aug. 10. Regarding the rumor that the Canadian Pacific are going to change their transfer point in connexion with the St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitoba from Emerson to Greta, Vice-President Van-Horne said today that it was untrue, and that the Canadian Pacific was making the arrangement in expectation of Norway's new line being a fact.

A Royal Visitor. LONDON, Aug. 10. The German Crown Prince arrived in Edinburgh to-day. He spent the day in sight seeing. Before he left London, Dr. Mackenzie performed another operation upon his throat. Electricity was applied to the larynx and the last traces of excrescence in the throat were successfully removed.

Another Conservative Victory. RICHMOND, Aug. 10. Phinney and LeBlanc, Conservatives, have been elected by an overwhelming majority, with two polling places to hear from. Their majority reaches 300, and it is thought that the districts to hear from will not reduce their vote much.

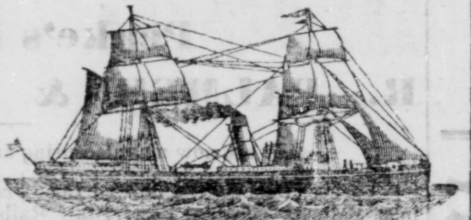
