Town Council At Alberton Hold Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Alberton Town Council was held in the Court House Monday evening with Mayor C. R. Profit presiding and Councillors Moran, Oulton, Corbett, Currie and Matthews in attendance.
Minutes of the last regular meeting and of a special meeting of the Council were read and approved. Bills amounting to \$234.89 were ordered paid and another bill amounting to \$8.00 will be paid when approved by the Fire Committee.
It was moved by Councillor Moran, seconded by Councillor Matthews, that rates of assessments, taxes and licenses be the same as last year with the exception of oil companies for which licenses will be fifty dollars per year.

Rev. J. R. McMahon, chairman of the library campaign, petitioned the Council to make a contribution toward the new library, if possible. After some discussion of the matter it was moved by Councillor Oulton, seconded by Councillor, and carried, that the town make a donation of \$200.00 to the building fund of the new library.
It was moved by Councillor Corbett, seconded by Councillor Moran and carried that the Town of Alberton be empowered to borrow from the Canadian Bank of Commerce by overdraft or otherwise a sum not exceeding \$1300.00, if and when needed.
The matter of speeding within the town limits was brought to the attention of the Council by Mr. Howard Clark. The matter was discussed and left to the Police Committee for action.

On motion of Councillor Matthews, seconded by Councillor Corbett an amendment was made to by-law 65 whereby fees paid to the pound keeper will be increased 100 per cent.
On motion of Councillor Corbett and Moran, Mr. Daniel McLean was appointed pound keeper.
It was decided the budget would be the same as last year.

Mention was made of the unsightly appearance of fences in front of two vacant lots on Main Street. The policeman is to be asked to repair one and the Town Clerk was instructed to write the owner of the other requesting him to improve the appearance of the one on his lot.
On motion it was decided to increase the license for meat pedlars to fifty dollars.
The Clerk was asked to write to the Deputy Minister of Public Works to ask if he could supply any culverts to the Town of Alberton.
On motion the meeting adjourned.

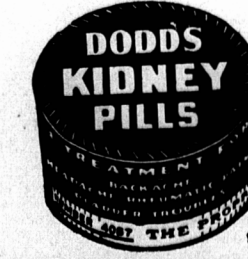
