Islanders Urged To Attend Polio Vaccination Clinic

A good many of Prince Edward Island residents have failed to take advantage of the opportunity offered to them during the past two years to become vaccinated against poliomyelitis, Dr. T. Gencheff, chairman of the Adult Vaccination Committee of the P.E.I. Chapter of the Polio Foundation stated last evening.

Noting that there are over 1,000 people who have attended one or two clinics but did not come for their remaining injections, Dr. Gencheff expressed the wish that many will learn from the bitter experience of the citizens of Montreal and Newfoundland, and take advantage of the facilities provided by attending the clinics, thus protecting themselves and their families against this dread disease.

"There is nothing worse than the suffering which is due to neglect, and there is no reason why any of you could not attend the clinics," he states.

Dr. Gencheff observes that according to the statistical release in the Winnipeg epidemic, those who had three injections were less affected than were those who had only one or two injections — not mentioning those who did not have any.

from the fear of the dread disease of poliomyelitis as, during this period, we did not have an epidemic in this province.

"Let us hope that we may still be free from polio in the future but, in view of the severe epidemic in the Montreal area and in Newfoundland at the present time, and the increase in the number of cases in our neighboring province of New Brunswick, we must realize that this disease is not a thing of the past."

The Adult Vaccination Committee chairman noted polio reached an all time high of 8,734 cases in Canada in 1953, and that the figures dropped to 253 cases in 1958.

"There is no doubt that the sharp drop in the number of cases has something to do with the large scale vaccination programs implemented in various parts of Canada.

"The most severely affected group in the Manitoba epidemic, and today in Montreal and Newfoundland, appears to be between the ages of 20-39 and according to statistics, poliomyelitis is becoming more and more a disease of the adult. Salk Vaccine is effective in about 90 per cent of the cases", he observed.

Dr. Gencheff urges all who have not received any vaccine and those who have not had their second and third injections to attend future clinics.

FIRST CLINIC TODAY

The first clinic will be held in Charlottetown today and other clinics will be held weekly in three or four places throughout the province.

In the first week of September clinics will be held at Cape Wolfe, O'Leary, Sturgeon, Bridgetown, Wellington and Lennox Island. Other clinics will be announced respectively in newspapers and over the radio.

"The arising of many cases in Montreal and Newfoundland, and lately in New Brunswick, is of great concern to us because the majority of these cases, according to medical authorities were not vaccinated and are, therefore suffering from the consequence

"From all 11 deaths from polio in Manitoba during 1958, none were vaccinated; there were those who contracted the disease after being vaccinated—one or two injections—but their paralysis was very mild and cleared away. Those who are still in iron lungs and suffering the effects of severe paralysis did not have any injections of Salk Vaccine," he said.
