THE MARKETS.—There was a 'air at end of the market to-day, with business steady. Eggs were in small supply at 20 cents per dozen. Butter fresh sold at 20 cents per lb., and tub at 18 cents per lb., but the supply and demand were small. Plams sold at 14 cents per quart, and damsons at 10 to 12 cents per quart. Hay was in good supply at 45 to 48 cents per hundred lbs. Oats steady at about 33 to 34 cents per bushel. Potatoes were moving well at 18 to 20 cents per bushel, but with a greater demand than the supply could meet. Other articles at usual prices.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.—A correspondent at Montague writes: "Fred. M. Clay, of Nova Scotia, gave a very interesting lecture here on Tuesday last in the Baptist Church to a large audience on 'British Columbia.'" Mr. Clay has spent two years on the Pacific Coast and his lecture is full of information. He will speak in several of our Island towns before returning to Nova Scotia, laying plainly before the people the advantages of that part of our Dominion over the States. Presbyterian Synod.

St. John, Oct. 7.

The Synod of the Maritime Province Presbyterian Church in Canada met last evening. Rev. H. B. McKay, of Wallace, retiring Moderator, conducted public worship and preached a sermon from the text, "Preach the Word." There has been only one death among over two hundred clergy during the year. Rev. Isaac Murray, D. D., North Sydney, received the undivided vote of the Synod as Rev. Mr. McKay's successor in the Moderator's chair.

Nelson Lowers His Record.

General Telegraphic News.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 5.—Immigration returns for the past nine months of the present year show that 33,289 immigrants have passed through Winnipeg by way of Port Arthur, destined for ports in Manitoba, the territories and British Columbia.

MONTREAL, Oct. 5.—John F. Mann, of Harbor Grace, Nfld., Standard left here today by steamer for Newfoundland. In speaking of the future of Newfoundland, Mr. Mann said there was a likelihood of the Island joining the Dominion confederation at an early date. Much union sentiment was being expressed in the towns, and even St. John's, which was at one time strongly against confederation, was much changed in this respect. Should the matter be brought before the people, Mr. Mann believes it would be endorsed by a large majority. He thought that under political union the islanders would enjoy cheaper foodstuffs, clothing, and in fact cheaper staples of most kinds.

St. John, Oct. 5.—The examination in the graveyard insurance case was concluded today, and the prisoners were sent up for trial at the county court on the fourth Tuesday of the month. Rev. Sidney W. Wilson was sentenced to jail in \$3,000, but that of the other two accused, Rev. C. B. Welton and Dr. Randall, was fixed at \$6,000, \$3,000 on each charge, and up to the present time they have not put up sufficient securities. The evidence of today was most pointed against the trio; hence the high figure at which the bail has been fixed.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Mgr. Sattoli and Mgr. O'Connell, papal delegates, will sail for New York tomorrow on the steamship Majestic. Their mission is to gain information for the Vatican as to the general condition of the Roman Catholic Church in the United States. The Fairbairn school matter and the consequent difficulty between Archbishop Ireland and Archbishop Corrigan probably will also be investigated.

Kingston, Ont., Oct. 5.—There is going to be a good business done this winter in shipping hay to England. The crop is light in that country. Dealers here are already making arrangements for the work and are guaranteed nearly \$2 per ton profit. Richardson & Sons and Joseph Franklin will start the business at once.
