

Xaverians Enter Dominion Finals

St. Francis Xavier University Varsity basketball team advanced to the Dominion Senior 'B' semi-finals here Saturday night with a 59-46 triumph over Saint Dunstan's.

The win gave the Xaverians the two game, total point series 119-96. The first game played at the Saint Dunstan's gym Friday night saw the X-men conquerors 69-52.

Saint Dunstan's, putting up a gallant bid against the classy crew from Nova Scotia, jumped into an early lead in the opening minutes but the visitors battled back and had things on a 20-20 basis at the half. In the closing chapter, the Maritime intercollegiate champions outscored the local scholars 39-26.

Both sides were missing some great chances in the opening half, with the Malpeque Road collegians especially coming up with some erratic shooting. The St. F. X. boys seemed tense in the opening half but snapped out of this in the final frame.

Once again Davenport was the big gun for the visitors, amassing 25 points, one less than he collected in the opening game. His teammate Foshay was next with 16. Gerry Tingley was again high man for the local Saints with 15.

Wild Scenes At Chicago When Hawks Are Beaten

CHICAGO (CP) — Montreal Canadiens, the 1958-59 National Hockey League champions, advanced to the Stanley Cup final Saturday night by shading Chicago Black Hawks 5-4 on a goal by Claude Provost with less than a minute and a half of regulation time remaining.

The triumph gave the Canadiens the best-of-seven semi-final playoff series 4-2 and they now await the winner of the Toronto-Boston semi-final, now deadlocked 3-3.

After Provost's goal, the infuriated crowd of 18,521—second only to the 20,004 who packed Chicago Stadium in a regular season game in 1947—held up play for about 15 minutes by tossing debris on the ice.

Two enraged Chicago fans dashed onto the ice and took swings at referee Red Storey after the game-winning goal.

This display preceded a roaring chant of "We Want Storey." Several fights broke out in the stands behind the Montreal bench.

The Canadiens, gunning for an unprecedented fourth straight title, will meet the winner of the Boston-Toronto series in Montreal Thursday.

Provost's goal, his second of the night, came on assists from Don Marshall and Phil Goyette, four minutes after Ted Lindsay pulled Chicago into a 4-4 tie at 14:32 of the third period.

It was a hard-fought game in which 23 penalties were called.

Montreal's Dickie Moore and Chicago's Ed Litzenger and Ted Lindsay also scored two goals each, Montreal's other goal was by Doug Harvey, when the game was only 2:20 old.

The Hawks could not get started

and did not get off a shot until five minutes had elapsed in the penalty-packed first period.

Storey, who last Saturday was criticized by Montreal coach Toe Blake for allowing the game to get too rough, called 12 infractions in the first period—five of them within 37 seconds.

With 13:05 gone, Lindsay tied the score 1-1 while Harvey was sitting out a penalty. Lindsay was assisted by Ted Sloan and Litzenger — the Chicago line which accounted for all the scoring.

The Hawks broke out in front early in the second period after goalie Glenn Hall made three brilliant saves in the first three minutes. Litzenger, on an assist from Sloan, tied in a short shot at 5:52 to put the Hawks ahead 2-1.

Montreal stormed back with two goals midway in the period to take a 3-2 lead. The Canadiens' leading pointmaker during the regular season—Moore—tied it up at 9:09 with Chicago's Eric Nesterenko in the penalty box. Moore was assisted by Tom Johnson and Marcel Bonin.

PUTS HABS IN FRONT

A little more than a minute later, while the Canadiens were short one man because of a penalty, Claude Provost stole the puck from Lindsay, skated three-quarters of the rink and beat Hall to put Montreal in front 3-2.

Early in the third period, Litzenger tied it up 3-3.

The teams raced back and forth for the next 10 minutes and with 13:18 gone, Moore made it 4-3.

A little more than a minute later, Lindsay rifled in a short shot to again tie the count. It looked as if the contest would go into a sudden-death overtime when Provost scored with a minute and 23 seconds left.

Then came the deluge of debris and the delay.

Boston Comes Off Floor To Tie Series With Leafs

TORONTO (CP) — Boston Bruins, fighting back from injuries and two desperate Toronto rallies, squeezed out a 5-4 victory against Maple Leafs Saturday night. The win sent the Stanley Cup semi-final round into a seventh and deciding game Tuesday at Boston.

Bruins, who twice held two-goal leads only to lose them, had three players limping through the third period when centre Bronco Horvath deflected Vic Stasiuk's shot off his elbow into the Leaf net for the winning goal.

Until that goal, at 12:56, Bruins appeared to be weakening under the rejuvenated Leafs who fought back from a two goal deficit twice.

Each team's top line contributed three goals. Johnny Bucyk, with two, and Horvath scored Bruins' final goals. Stasiuk is the third member of that line. Early in the first period Jerry Toppazzini and Don MacKenney scored to give Bruins a 2-0 lead.

The Gerry Elman-Frank Mahovich-Billy Harris line of Leafs scored three goals, Mahovich getting two and Elman the other. Bert Olmstead scored the first Leaf goal on the power play.

Toppazzini, hit hard by Leafs Allan Stanley midway through the second period, suffered possible broken ribs but was back in action in the third period.

Morrison needed 15 stitches to close a cut on his lip, inflicted by a flying puck in the second. Armstrong pulled a groin muscle in the same period but took his regular turn during the third.

Leaflets threw everything they could muster up at the Bruins during the last seven minutes of the game but Boston netminder Harry Lumley, kicked out everything in his typically sensational manner.

Lumley made 27 saves while Johnny Bower of Leafs had a busier time, stopping 51 drives.

Toppazzini started Bruins off with a 30-footer through a maze of players at 7:28 of the first while Olmstead was off for elbowing. Two minutes later MacKenney extended the lead to 2-0. Leafs sliced the lead by half at 15:13 when O'Leary tipped Brewer's shot past Lumley. At the time both Stasiuk and Mackell were in the penalty box.

Mahovich tied the score at 3:50 of the second. Bruins took their second two-goal lead before the end of the period, Bucyk scoring at 9:57 when he batted Horvath's rebound past Bower and again at 17:19 when he beat Bower with a 20-footer after taking a pass from Horvath.

Art Wall Is Winner

AUGUSTA, Ga. (CP)—Art Wall, a sad-faced golfer with a sweet putter, won the Masters golf tournament Sunday as Canada's Stan Leonard fell into fourth place tie on a shaky final round.

Wall, six strokes behind the co-leaders at the start of the final day, shot a round of 64-66 over the par 36-36-72 Augusta National course for a 72-hole score of 294. He shot birdies on five of the last six holes.

Cary Middlecoff, the 1955 Masters winner, finished second after failing in a desperate bid to tie on the finishing hole. Middlecoff had a final round of 72 for a total of 285.

Defending champion Arnold Palmer, who was tied with Leonard for first place at the start of the final round, salvaged third place at 286. He had a 64 on the final round.

FOURTH PLACE TIE

Leonard shot a 75 on the final to tie former open champion Dick Mayer for fourth place with 287.

Wall's finishing 66 equalled the last-round record for the Masters made by Doug Ford when he won the title two years ago.

The lean, 35-year-old shotmaker from Peconic Manor, Pa., literally came from nowhere to overtake Palmer and Leonard and then stood off closing bids by Leonard and Middlecoff.

Wall had rounds of 73-74-71-66—184-four strokes under par for the Augusta National course, which again was jammed by a huge gallery Sunday for the finish of the 23rd Masters.

Wall is the leading money winner on the professional tour this year, has won one previous tournament and has finished second three times. But in 10 years of professional golf he never has won a tournament of major importance.

Lions Ready To Face West

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—Sal Maglie, who helped pitch New York Giants, Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Yankees to four pennants, is considering an offer to serve as a pitching coach in the St. Louis Cardinals farm system.

Maglie revealed Friday the offer was made Thursday by Cardinal general manager Bing Devine after announcement that the Cardinals were giving the 42-year-old right-hander his unconditional release.

"I deeply appreciate their offer," Maglie said Friday in the Cardinal training camp clubhouse. "But I don't know whether I'd think it over and let him know in a few days."

Maglie thinks he can still win in the majors. The Buffalo native, familiarly known as the barber, owns one of the best lifetime won-lost records in the majors with 119 victories and 62 defeats.

Mathers, a native of Winnipeg, suffered the injury during a game with Cleveland Barons at Hershey. The Bears won 2-1 and lead the best-of-seven semi-final series 2-1.
