

Beautiful Bridal Gowns.

A CINCINNATI BELLE'S MAGNIFICENT TROUSSEAU—THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS IN ELABORATE DRESS.

One of our best belles, judged by an extreme standard of fashion, has now distinguished herself by having four dresses made in extra semblance of four which are in the trousseau of the Princess Beatrice of England. The first is a travelling gown of rough English cloth in navy blue and red stripes of narrow width. The skirt has pleats down the front and the overskirt is arranged in pleats and panels that hang straight and give the effect of a redingote. The basque has a notched collar like that in men's morning coats and is worn with a cravat of dull red silk; the back rests smoothly on the tounure and is very short. Blue braid is stitched on the edges and the buttons are blue. The Tom O'Shanter cap is of dark red cloth, with a blue quill thrust through it. The second is for yachting and tennis. It is of cream-white flannel, with turquoise blue wool inlaid in small pleats between the large box pleats of the skirt. The pleated basque is of the white flannel, with high officer's collar and a notched collar edged with blue; the belt is also white, with blue edging. A sailor hat is of rough white straw, with blue canvass-ribbon band. The third is of dark red habit cloth, with Ottoman silk of the same shade forming the vest and inlaid between the wide box pleats of the skirt. The drapery is very short, with many curves, and is very bouffant. The basque is sharply pointed in front, short on the hips and pleated like a habit in the back. The silk vest laps over the fastening of the lining in one piece, in Breton fashion, and has revers in the upper part; the officer's collar also has silk in front. The English turban worn with it is of the red silk laid in fold and ornamented with a gold pin. The fourth dress has a waist of navy blue webbing, with blue serge skirts and trimming of crimson and blue blocks. The false skirt has a pleating of the blue around the bottom and the serge is laid over this several plain on the front and sides, with all fullness massed in pleats behind. There is a band of blocked wool around the skirt and the edge is scalloped and bound. The short apron overskirt is trimmed like the lower skirt and is mounted above the edge of the waist of Jersey webbing. A crimson vest is fastened by two rows of pale blue buttons.

The Potato Crop in England.

Drought of long continuance has seriously diminished the average of the season's productions. Correspondents agree in representing the potato crop as seriously prejudiced, and in fact endangered by the smallness of the rainfall, because should rain occur shortly—as appears probable—supertuberation is likely to be general. To some extent that evil is preventable by the simple operation of lifting before it occurs—a proposal many will meet with the truthful statement that in respect of the late sorts there is in many places nothing to lift as yet. However, we have before us an illustration of the practical character of our oft-repeated doctrine that the crop should be secured from the moment it may be properly said to exist, and very many growers would do better to lift now than wait in the expectation of an increase. The early sorts will be light, but we do not as yet despair of the later kinds.—Gardener's Magazine.

Will Mr. Bennett Sell the N. Y. "Herald."

A report is current in New York that John W. Mackay is negotiating with James Gordon Bennett for the purchase of the New York Herald, with the intention of putting John Russell Young at the head of its editorial staff. Mr. Mackay is interested with Mr. Bennett in the Bennett-Mackay cable, in the construction of which \$8,000,000 is said to have been sunk. For Mr. Bennett's share of this enterprise Mr. Mackay is reported to hold a mortgage on the Herald. Mackay's wealth is much talked about in this connexion. He is said to have \$21,000,000 in securities locked up in his strong box—\$5,000,000 in United States 4 per cents, \$5,000,000 in rentes, \$5,000,000 in consols and \$6,000,000 in state securities of the U. S., bearing 5 to 8 per cent, interest. In addition to this is his cable investment and his interest in the Bank of Nevada. The gossip runs that he would be able to back the Herald with \$30,000,000.
