Fred Atkins Here For Wrestling Match Tonight

Fred Atkins, the former British Empire Champion, will be seen in action tonight at the Sports Arena in Charlottetown. The rock ribbed champion of Australia goes against rangey Len Hughes from Northampton, Mass. Atkins weighs 240 lbs and stands six feet two inches in height, and along with his hardy, tanned muscular physique brings with him into the ring a sound, experienced and rugged wrestling knowledge, that makes him one of the top men in the game anywhere and a serious threat to the best men in North America.

While there are few wrestlers who can surpass the hardy Atkins in sound mat background, he adds to his ability a rough, rugged style that is most punishing and damaging for his rivals.

The wiry, kinky-haired Aussie can not only match the best matmen in the favorite game for hold, but has a favorite, effective specialty of his own, called the Kangaroo Klutch, with which he wins most of his matches. It's a painful, leg-tangling grip and a real knock-out hold that usually spells victory for flimsy Fred and curtains for his unlucky opponent.

Since his arrival in North America from down under, the Gibraltar like Australian Athletic has had numerous important wrestling matches in Canada and the United States. In his campaigning on this side of the water to date, the oaken built Australian heavyweight champion has racked up an almost unbroken number of

wins. He is also an experienced, and dangerous team wrestler. Atkins is such a rough and ready, salty, take-all-comers sort of bird that he has only one idea in mind when he steps through the ropes, namely to win, in any and the quickest manner.

Also on this fine wrestling card Thursday is a tag team match starring Frank Valois and his partner Emil Dupre against Big Jim Bernard and his partner Bull Montana.

Two Long-Time Travellers Prove Golf Begins At 40

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP)—A couple of longtime travellers on the pro circuit, operating on the theory that golf begins at 40, showed the way Wednesday to a big field in the first round of the Canadian Open.

Henry Robinson, 46-year-old veteran from St. Andrews, Ill., and Ed (Porky) Oliver, 41, from Canton, Mass., shot 68, three under Westmont Golf Club's par, before the tail end of the field had even started.

The pair of veterans each fired nine of 226 against par 35-36. On the runner-up bracket at 69 were Doug Ford, a pre-tournament favorite, and Mike Fitchick, both of Mahopac, N.Y.; Don Fairfield of Casey, Ill., and Mike Souhak of Grossinger's, N.Y.

Two Kitchener golfers, Gerry Kesselring and Moe Norman, bobbed up as low Canadians, tied at 70 along with a big group of American pros. Kesselring, a regular on the tour and now playing out of Toronto Downsview, shot a pair of 35s and Norman had 34-36.

Two Canadian amateurs, one 15 years old, crowded into the long par-71 bracket. Bob Panasuk of Windsor, Ont., the budding teenager, shot 36-35 and Jerry Magee of Toronto, one of Canada's top ranking amateurs fired 33-38 against Westmont's par 35-36.

Murray Tucker of Toronto Rosedale also finished with 71, shooting 34-37 to become second low Canadian pro to Norman, who turned pro after winning the last two Canadian amateur championships.

George Bayer, long-hitting pro from Los Angeles, was one of the late finishers and had a chance to break into the lead but wasted two shots at the par-five 54-yard 11th. He finished with 70 as did Arnold Palmer, winner two years ago.

Frick Has No Idea Whether Giants & Dodgers Will Go

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Baseball commissioner Ford Frick said Wednesday he has no idea whether Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants franchises will be transferred to the west coast.

Frick made the admission following an "exploratory" closed meeting with top minor league officials to discuss realignment of their leagues in event of threatened major league expansion or franchise shifts.

"We have nothing specific to announce," the commissioner said. "This was merely a fact finding session. We found out that we don't know where we're going."

Frick said he had called the meeting of the presidents of the seven top minor leagues and their head, George M. Trautman, for

The St. Andrews pro, who owns a ranch in Texas and now plays on the money circuit largely during the summer tour, started down the back nine with a string of five pars. He went over at the 15th, taking three from the edge of the green. It was at the 17th he missed his birdie putt but dropped a five.

NEVER OVER PAR
Oliver was never over par in his round. A chip shot at the first left him with a one-foot birdie putt and he sank a 12-footer at the fourth. A six-footer at the seventh put him three under and the rotund vet-

eran from there on rattled off 11 straight pars.

There were several scratches Wednesday but the field was still more than 160. A few found themselves eliminated because of the first-round regulation by which those with 85 or higher were through for the tournament.

Doug Sanders of Miami, winner of the Canadian Open last year in a playoff with Dow Finsterwald at Montreal Beaconfield, took a 75 in his first round. Finsterwald, from Tequesta, Fla., showed up at the clubhouse but had to scratch because of a severe cold.

Frank Boynton of San Landro, Fla., 20 years old and youngest on the tour, missed a chance to get up with the leaders when he was over par at two of the last three holes. He was out in 33 and back in 37 for 70. Boynton's wife was on the point of sobbing when her slim young husband finished.

Norman, something of the people's choice along with Kesselring, was hitting the greens regularly but three-putted two of them. His birdie putts were all on the back nine and he finished his round with an eight-footer at the 18th. It was Moe's 27th birthday.

Kesselring, forecasting about 277 as the winning score of the tournament if the wind conditions persist, was out in par 35. He birdied the 14th and 18th coming in, going over par at the par-four 16th.

Ford, leading money winner on the circuit, was out in 33 but took par 36 coming home. Magee, also out in 33, lost a stroke at the 12th, birdied the 13th and again went over par at the 15th and 16th.
