The Suit Against Senecal.

A Good Suggestion—Adopted!

ACTING upon the suggestion of THE EXAMINER, the Government have, we learn, appointed Mr. George E. Robinson to the position in Prince of Wales College and Normal School heretofore occupied by Mr. D. J. McLeod.

If the position be accepted by Mr. Robinson, the office of Secretary for the Charlottetown School Board will again be vacant. Mr. Oxenham filled that office for several years.

The Markets.

THE status quo has been maintained throughout the past week in respect to markets for produce. Prices of oats continue at thirty cents for black and thirty-two cents for white; prices of potatoes at from 18 cents for McIntyres or Chenangos to 25 cents for Garnets.

Later and more reliable advices from Great Britain report that excellent crops of oats were stored there before the recent storms came on, and that much dependence is placed upon the immense crop of corn which has been secured in the States.

Pork is quoted in Toronto at \$17.50 for mess and in Chicago it is quoted from \$8.60 to \$8.75. We are unable to account for this great difference.

Temperance Items.

Fifteen years ago 6,185 persons were licensed to sell liquor in the Province of Ontario. Last year the number was reduced to 3,500, although the population had considerably increased in the meantime.

Halifax clergymen are making general plea with their congregations not to sign petitions for liquor licenses. No license can be granted in Halifax unless it is petitioned for by three-fifths of the ratepayers residing in the district for which the license is asked.

Dr. E. M. Hunt, sanitary editor of the New York Independent, says in a recent number of that journal: "Outside all questions of home and of morals, the physical harm being done by beer is appalling. Even Germany has been compelled to raise its voice against it."
