crux of the electric problem in this province. He believed that the present bottleneck could be met set up a Maritime Power Commission to study the question of bringing power into the Province.

At the outset of the discussion Mr. Yeo pointed out that this was not an indignation meeting and that the rural electrification issue was not being used as a political football. The definite feeling prevailed, however, that it was time that action must be taken to solve the problem.

Another clause in the resolution urged a policy of financial credit to rural people to encourage all themselves of electrical services.

The meeting, which got underway at 8:45 and continued for almost three hours was addressed by numerous speakers. Among them were Messrs. L. P. McIsaac, Smith, MacFarlane, Harrington, John H. Myers, Hampton, Woodrow Wheatley, East Royalty; Roland MacDonald, Southport; Lloyd Docherty, Hamilton; Louis O'Connor, Clinton; Blythe Howatt, Darnley; Murdoch MacLeod, Long River; Edison Raynor, Kensington; Elmer O'Hanley, Monticello; Mr. Lord, Bedouque; Mr. Judson, Alexandria; and Mr. Pridham, Alberton.

Mr. McIsaac stated that he was not being critical of the government or anyone. He pointed out that of the 11,000 rural homes in the Province only about 1.3 have electricity and that this is being built. Of these 22 miles 11 were to Tyne Valley and O'Leary to Alberton, last year's commitments.

The new power line from Charlottetown to the Summerside airport is no help to the rural areas, he stated. He said that the present coverage seems to be the limit for the present with the reason being that a sincere and anxious management is controlled by investors in the company who are thinking more of dividends on money invested than they are of a service to the people or the development of the Province.

"The existing policy of the Government or its Public Utilities Board, we are told, is to allow rates to give them at least 7% on capital investment," he stated. "The situation now appears to be that the Maritime Electric can not expand, buy equipment, build lines unless they get more money. They can't get money unless they get higher dividends, hence they want higher rates."

Need 500 Miles New Lines "We need about 500 miles of new lines in P. E. I. to have 75-80% coverage of electricity," he continued. At possibly 100 miles a year this would take five years, he estimated. The present cost of installing a mile of line here is about \$3500. The cost of a year for installation. He pointed out that the cost of installing lines in other provinces was cheaper. Quebec for example was about \$2500.

He estimated that one million dollars a year (including line, administration and technical expenses) would electrify the province in five years. This would be made possible if the problem were approached from a Maritime standpoint, he added.

He pointed out that the Dominion Government is spending hundreds of millions of dollars in other industrial developments, defense plants and local industries while we are getting little for the development of the only three industries in the province.

He stated that three quarters of a million dollars annually for five years to develop the agricultural industry here would virtually put Prince Edward Island on its feet and a Provincial or a Maritime Power Board could then pay its way.

Mr. Pridham of Alberton stated that the big problem in his part of the Province was to get electricity not the rates although the present rates for anyone with electricity was three times as high as those who were serviced in other areas. He suggested that the Co-operatives take over and electrify the whole province.

Mr. John Myers stated that electricity was a great way to keep young people on the farms. On his own farm he said he never had to pay more than \$7.00 a month.

Another speaker claimed that he had to pay at least \$9.00 for electricity every month and he was not over extravagant. He complained of people on a commercial basis having to pay as much as \$25.00 a month to operate.

Lloyd Docherty of Hamilton stated that the people in his section of the Province have been very much concerned about the electrical problem for the past six years but have not gotten anywhere yet.

Mr. Blythe Howatt, Darnley, stated that his district was surrounded by electricity but the people could not track it down for their own use. He suggested that they might buy their own line.

sick and the identification of the trouble as hoof-and-mouth disease.

It should not have taken three months, he said, for this diagnosis to have been made. It would be a reflection on the veterinary profession of Canada to intimate they could not determine the nature of the disease in shorter time than was done in respect to last winter's epidemic.

Asks Question

The Queens member asked Mr. Gardner to confirm or deny the report that bodies of poultry slaughtered in Nova Scotia infected with Newcastle disease had not been properly disposed of, had been found by seagulls, and that as a result, many seagulls in Northumberland Strait had died of the malady. The Minister did not reply immediately but is expected to do so later when his specialist officials are with him in the House.

Mr. MacLean noted that the farm income for all Canada is listed at one and a half billion dollars. At the same time, the total national budget is four billion dollars. It was a surprise to him, he said, that the Government was running a business almost three times as great as the entire agricultural industry of Canada. The comparison indicated, he continued, the need of the government to foster and stimulate agricultural production.

"Our food supply," he said, "is becoming relatively less and less in proportion to our population and I believe both from a general economic and a defence point of view that agriculture should be brought as near potential as possible. He felt that the department should go to greater lengths than it does to improve farming methods. There are some farmers today who are not as efficient as they might be, and these could be aided by counsel as to how to farm their holdings more efficiently and with greater benefit to themselves.

Mr. MacLean also asked the Minister to bring down the form of compensation for the slaughter of their herds infected with hoof-and-mouth disease and their flocks stricken with Newcastle

continued. "We may as well face the facts - margins are here to stay and we must find a way to compete with it as the price of butter will be governed by the price of margarine."

"So far the only value we have placed on milk is in the butterfat. But today butterfat has become a by-product and the solids are becoming the valued parts. It has been found that there is as much food value in a pound of powdered milk as there is in a pound of beef steak and that there is a big demand for this skimmed milk powder all over the world."

"There is every indication that there are unlimited demands for solids, not the fat part of the milk, and we must change to the way of producing these solids," he concluded.

The question of financing these plants was raised by Mr. Austin Laird. His criticisms were not accepted by the meeting, however, as Mr. Laird was not a delegate or a member of the Federation.

Messrs. Earl Ings, Mount Herbert, Gerald Handrighan, Tignish, and Cyrus Poirier, Linkletter Road, spoke of the benefits which such dairy plants would bring the Province.

A resolution passed by the meeting recommended the promotion of an accident insurance scheme for the Federation members. This scheme would cost \$5.00 plus the

\$8.00 for Federation membership and the policy would be worth \$1,000 to cover all accidents. Wives and children would be eligible to join but before the scheme could be put into effect there must be a certain number, possibly 5,000 members.

Other speakers at the meeting included Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture; Lincoln Dewar, secretary of the Federation; J. B. MacIsaac, Rock Berra; and Charles Yeo, Federation President, who reported on a recent C. F. A. directors meeting in Ottawa.

At the evening meeting Mr. D. A. MacDonald, Glenfinnan was re-elected as Queens County representative on the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board.
