Three Juveniles Escape Jail, Are Recaptured

Summerside juveniles are in the news again. Last night three of them saved their way out of Prince County Jail and in an hour and a half at liberty helped themselves to new spring outfits, apparently at the store of Maurice Mill Mun's Wear.

They escaped at about 9:30 sawing through a bar over a window and then dropping eight feet to the ground. One of four who were in jail elected to remain.

The four had been placed in jail about ten days ago, following the passing of an act in the Legislature which permitted detention of juveniles in county jails. They were awaiting trial in juvenile court but, as far as could be learned, no date had been set for the trial.

After the escape last night a search was started and shortly after 11 the three were picked up by Royal Canadian Mounted Police on Water Street, not far from the Mill store. Entrance to the store had apparently been made by breaking a window at the rear.

Earlier the boys were reported to have confessed to police to committing a variety of breaks, thefts of property and car thefts during the past three or four months. Previous to the passing of this act they were always released by police after confessions were obtained and then they would be involved again.

The Province has no proper detention home for juveniles and apparently they are no longer acceptable in such homes in other Provinces who have their own juveniles to look after. Their place of confinement in the Prince County jail was on the main floor apart from the other prisoners and they were in the same room.

The article used in cutting the bar was not found but the history of such incidents in this jail would indicate that the bars are not very hard to cut. It is understood that they had a visitor shortly before they escaped and at that time everything seemed to be in order. Immediately after they were missed both R. C. M. P. and Town Police commenced a search.

Holman's Plan Store In New Glasgow, N.S.

A Prince Edward Island firm is about to branch out on the mainland. It has been learned, R. T. Holman Ltd. have leased a store property in New Glasgow, N.S., and shortly plan to open a ladies fashion store there. Although Holman's has steadily expanded its business on Prince Edward Island during the past twenty four years, this is the first retail store to be established by the firm outside this province. The Holman firm was founded in 1837 by the late Robert Tinson Holman in a simple wooden structure, 30 feet long by 20 feet wide. During the years the business prospered so that now Holman's occupies a large plant in Summerside composed of a four storey brick building as well as numerous warehouses. It is a complete departmental store with over 200 employees. In 1924, Holman's opened a branch in Charlottetown with three departments, china, hardware and furniture. Last year the "Little Shopper" featuring ladies' wear was opened on Kent Street and several weeks ago the announcement was made that a property had been purchased on that street which will make a further expansion possible when considered to be desirable. Although the New Glasgow store will be the first retail outlet of the firm outside the province, for the past ten years or so a growing wholesale business has been carried on in Nova Scotia and parts of New Brunswick. Two commercial travellers call on the trade in the interests of Holman's wholesale department. The president and general manager of the firm, Robert T. Holman and the two vice-presidents, Harry T. and Alan Holman are grandsons of the founder. - S.

S.D.U. Hoop Team Defeats St. Joseph's 100-49

Paced by the terrific shooting of Jack Reardon the St. Dunstan's University basketball squad pounded out a convincing 100-49 decision over a less experienced St. Joseph's University team from Memramcook, New Brunswick, in an exhibition game at P. W. C. auditorium Saturday night. The game was the second in a home and home exhibition series. Reardon had himself quite a night, scoring 18 points in the initial stanza and adding 33 more in the second frame to chalk up a record-breaking 51 markers for the night's play. "Long Jaws" performance rates as a new individual scoring record for the P. W. C. court, bettering the old mark of 43, set last year by the same Reardon and also by the "Y's" Don MacLean. From the time Pete Dunphy scored on a lay-up with the game only seconds old, the issue was never in doubt. U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, April 1 - (AP) Steel production rose to a 1951 high last week, the magazine Steel says today. The weekly journal reports an estimated output of 2,069,000 tons was scheduled, compared with a previous weekly high of 2,025,000 tons for the week ended Feb. 3.

Nationally, the ingot rate rose three points to 103.5 per cent of capacity. The rise was chiefly due to the renewal of operations at Jones & Laughlin Steel Corp.'s Pittsburgh works. A plant railroad dispute had been in effect there.

Plan 10-Acre Recreation Area In Summerside

Plans have been drawn up, and are now ready to be submitted to the Town Council for approval, which will give Summerside a recreation area of approximately ten acres. In this area will be a section for every age group from a playground for the children to a quiet park for older people.

The former Brennan property to the north of the high school and the present baseball diamond will be the location of this new project. Beaver Street from Summer to Granville Street will be closed to bring these two sections into one, if the scheme receives council approval.

This is the last section of land available for a recreation center that is within easy walking distance of almost all parts of the town, and the Town Council showed foresight in acquiring it. If the proposed plan is carried through to its conclusion athletic facilities will be available to the people of the town such as are found in few cities of much greater population.

The whole east side of the area from Green Street to Betty Avenue will be one large athletic field. The baseball diamond will remain in its present general location but will be moved slightly north to lengthen out right field. Dougout will be built and the present bleachers will be extended. North of this will be two smaller baseball diamonds for boys of midget age or younger and this section will be used as a football field in the fall. The whole will be surrounded by a
