British Shipping.

ACCORDING to the last returns, the Merchant Marine of Great Britain now includes about 9,000,000 tons, and that of her Colonies, 1,500,000 tons. This showing is greatly in advance of that of any other nation.

The showing as to vessels of war is not quite so favorable. Though Great Britain possesses many more war vessels than any other nation, the difference is not so great as it is with respect to the merchant marine.

The Finances of Manitoba.

MANITOBA is, financially, in a good position. She owes, it is true, a debt of \$1,913,000, but the cost of this debt is defrayed by payments from the railways for the construction of which it was incurred.

The Scott Act.

AS important point has been raised in Toronto in regard to the Scott Act. It is contended that the Act is repealed, and is, consequently, not now in force for the following reason: The Dominion Statutes have been issued in a new form under the name of revised statutes of Canada, and by them all the old statutes consolidated therein have been repealed and re-enacted in a revised form; but it is claimed that the Scott Act once repealed, cannot be re-enacted except by the voice of the people, and having been repealed is not in force until it has been again voted upon.

At a recent meeting of the Toronto City Council, the following resolution was submitted: "That this council memorialize the Government of Canada to consider the expediency of advising His Excellency, the Governor-General in commemoration of the jubilee year to liberate all prisoners incarcerated in our prisons for light offences and short terms, who have given evidences of good conduct and reformation, such prisoners, if possible, to be set free on July the 1st next, the 29th anniversary of our Dominion, and by so doing follow the good example of Lord Dufferin in India, who liberated this year 23,700 good conduct men and women."

Six Days in a Dory

ON THE BROAD ATLANTIC WITHOUT FOOD OR WATER.

The bark Kate McGuire, Capt. Temple, arrived at North Sydney on the evening of the 27th, from Buenos Ayres, having on board two American fishermen, who were picked up in a dory off Canso. The men were in a terribly exhausted condition, having been six days without food or water. Their names are Edward Hogan and John Brown, of the American fishing schooner Richard Lester, Capt. John E. Vibert, and were fishing on the Banquero banks. They belong to Quebec and Boston respectively. They left their vessel, the Richard Lester, of Gloucester, Mass., at four o'clock on the morning of Thursday, the 19th inst., for the purpose of visiting their trawls, a dense fog prevailing at the time.
