STILL IN THE RING.—Mr. P. R. Bowers, formerly of Charlottetown, is soon to begin the publication of a weekly newspaper at St. John's, Nfld. It will be a Sunday paper printed on Saturday afternoon. It will be in 8-page form, each page containing 32 columns, and will sell for one cent.

CANCER PARASITE FOUND.—The New York Herald prints the following from Paris: Dr. Bra confirms the statement that he has succeeded in isolating the parasite which is invariably present in cancer-growths. It is a fungoid of the ascomycetes family, and certainly an active agent of cancer. Inoculations of animals with a cultivation produced cancerous tumors from which the parasite was again isolated. With the modesty of the true scientist, Dr. Bra declines to hold out premature hopes for a curative treatment for cancer. So far he has only made insufficient clinical experiments but admits that these are very encouraging and says he will be able to speak with certainty in a few months.

THE WOMEN WIN.—The municipal experiments of Mayor Piogree, of Detroit, and Mayor Jones, of Toledo, pale into insignificance beside the new conditions in Beattie, Kansas. The issue of the last municipal election was squarely between the sexes, with all party politics forgotten. The men ran a ticket and the women ran a ticket, and the women won after the hottest political fight in the history of the city. It snowed hard all day, but the women heeled hustled through the storm and polled a full vote. Not only is the Mayor elect a woman, but five of the five members of the Council are of the same sex. The Mayor-elect says she will fill all the city offices with women, including that of city marshal.

The Cuban Army.

HAYANA, April 14.—The Cuban army muster rolls, which were delivered last evening to Governor General Brook, through Senor Domingo Mendez Capote, are preparing in neat, clerical style, the 1,200 broad sheets showing on their face 48,000 names—6,000 commissioned men and 42,000 non-commissioned officers and privates. The whole statement is an orderly arrangement of corps, regiments, battalions and companies. The company number exactly fifty privates.

The United States military authorities make no attempt to reconcile the 42,000 non-commissioned officers and privates indicated by these rolls with the 12,219 given in the estimates prepared under the direction of the provincial governors.

Refuge for Laurier.

MONTREAL, April 14.—The visit of Chief Justice Strong to Montreal has given rise to a report that the learned head of the Supreme Court will go permanently to England, in the near future. Coupled with this is the rumor that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is tired of politics, and will seek to retreat in the highest court of the land. It is stated that if the Canadian prime minister can induce the Imperial government to contribute \$7,500 towards the regular stipend for the Canadian representative in the Judicial Committee of the Queen's Privy Council, the Dominion would provide a like sum. With a salary of \$15,000 Chief Justice Strong could be asked to devote his whole time to the Imperial court, and this would leave a vacancy to be filled at Ottawa, by no other than Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Big Man Gone.

LONDON, April 14.—The Star announces the death at Macclesfield of Leo Whitton, who was alleged to have been the heaviest man in the world. He weighed 714 pounds, and was a native of Huestings county, Ontario. He had exhibited himself as a museum curiosity, and died from the effects of a chill contracted in his exhibitions. He was married and the father of three children.

Lord Rosebery Again

LONDON, April 14.—The Daily Mail says: "We understand that the Earl of Rosebery is about to resume active political life."

A By-Law for Levying and Specifying the Rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property and Poll in the City of Charlottetown for a Waterworks Fund, under Statute 50th Victoria, Chapter 8.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. The rate of Assessment on Real Estate or a Waterworks Fund under said Statute or the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the general Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein made and duly returned by them on the twenty-first day of March, A. D. 1899.

2nd. The rate of Assessment on Personal Property for such Water Works Fund for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.

3rd. The amount of Poll Tax to be paid by every person returned by the said Assessors in said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll as liable thereto for such Waterworks Fund under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the 31st day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the sum of Ten Cents (10c) on the poll of every person so assessed and returned as aforesaid.

A By-law for allowing a Rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes for the current year ending the thirty-first day of December A. D. 1899.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. A discount at the rate of Two and One-half Per Cent shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall, on or before the Fifteenth day of July next, A. D. 1899, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Personal Property for civic purposes.

A By-law for levying and specifying the rate of assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes under Statute 51 Victoria, Chapter 12.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate for general civic purposes under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and all persons liable to pay Poll Tax therein, made and duly returned by them on the twenty-third day of March, A. D. 1899.

2nd. The rate of assessment on Personal Property for such general civic purposes, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1899, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1899, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of seven-eighths of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.
