OTTAWA, Sept. 13 - (CP) -
Canada's stocks of meat at Sept. 1
were 10,000,000 pounds less than
what they were a month ago, the
Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Stocks totalled 48,380,000 pounds
at Sept. 1, compared with 58,701,
000 Aug. 1, and 50,917,000 on Sept. 1,
1949.

East Prince Teachers
Hold Fall Convention

The teachers of East Prince held
their annual local convention at the
High School auditorium in Sum-
merside yesterday with Donald
MacLean of Tyne Valley in the
chair and Miss Ruth Croken of
Summerside acting as secretary.

Mr. MacLean, in presenting his
report reminded the teachers that
remuneration, though important
was not as important as service. He
quoted Sir William Osler's words:
" We are here to add what we can
to life, not to get what we can
from life." He urged the teachers
to so teach that when the end of
their lives came they might with
justifiable pride bequeath to man-
kind a richer and nobler heritage.

Benjamin Beck, a member of the
P. E. I. T. F. Board of Governors,
gave a report on the year's activi-
ties. In concluding he asked teach-
ers to help improve the Federa-
tion with their suggestions for its
betterment.

H. B. MacLean of Vancouver,
B. C., originator of the MacLean
method of writing, gave a highly
interesting address on the me-
chanics of the art of writing. In-
spiring his remarks with humor,
Mr. MacLean gave a very lucid
demonstration of how writing should
be taught.

D. B. Lusty, assistant supervisor
of school broadcasts, (Maritimes
and Newfoundland), gave a review
of what is being accomplished in
these radio school presentations.
He stated that the best available
people are chosen to write and
present these broadcasts, and that
an average of fifteen hours' re-
search is spent for a fifteen min-
ute broadcast. He told the gather-
ing that a great compliment had
been paid the agricultural science
broadcasts written by G. Ralph
MacLean, B.A. and presented by
Dr. L. W. Shaw, M.A., L.L.D. when
the Ontario Department of
Education, after hearing recordings
of some of the broadcasts, request-
ed that they might receive as many
more of the broadcast recordings
as would be given that year to be
used in the Ontario schools.

Mr. Lusty advised that when the
school boards bought radios for
the schools they be sure to buy a
good one so that the reception
might be clear and the tone good.

Gives Health Talk

Dr. Brian J. O'Meara, now con-
nected with the Department of
Public Health in Charlottetown,
gave the teachers a talk on the
importance to children of correct
dental care. Nutrition, oral hygiene
and early dental treatment were
the three important things. Experi-
ments had shown that decay of
children's teeth had been reduced
by 60 percent by having them brush
their teeth after every meal.

C. B. Jelly in the morning and
Malcolm MacKenzie in the after-
noon went over the course of stud-
ies with the teachers, pointing out
the changes from last year.

Dr. Lloyd Shaw, director of edu-
cation for Prince Edward Island,
was the chief speaker in the after-
noon session. He told the teachers
to pay attention to the characters
and personalities of their pupils as
well as to the knowledge and skills
to be imparted to them. He re-
minded them that teaching meth-
ods are constantly changing and
improving and they must make an
effort to keep up with those im-
provements. Island agriculture and
other industries, said Dr. Shaw,
will not be able to keep pace with
industries in other parts of Can-
ada " if we do not use better meth-
ods in educating those who will be
our workers in future years." He
asked the teachers to remember
that teaching was a true profes-
sion, that it required mature minds
and considerable preparatory train-

ing before one could hope to be
proficient in it.

Miss Helen Yeo, P. W. C. English
teacher, gave a demonstration on
the teaching of spelling. Mrs. Harry
Cudmore spoke to the teaching
group on behalf of the Junior Red
Cross, and there was brief ques-
tion and discussion period. The fol-
lowing slate of officers was brought in
and the nominations were duly
elected: President - Donald Mac-
Lean; vice-president, Miss Mamie
Mill; secretary, Miss Aletha Gra-
ham.

Resolutions were passed express-
ing the thanks of the teaching body
for various services rendered. In
addition the following resolutions
were passed:

Whereas many teachers are too
reserved to voice their opinions to
the convention at large, be it re-
solved that at future conventions a
period be given by the president to
segregate the teachers into groups
wherein they may discuss freely
their problems.

Whereas the Department has al-
ready given generously and where-
as the changes in school books
has been considerable, be it re-
solved that the Department of Edu-
cation be urged to increase the
help already given to defray the
cost of new school books in the
future.

Whereas there was some confu-
sion in geography matriculation ex-
amination in 1950, be it resolved
that the Department of Education
be urged to present questions more
clearly. - S

U. S. Poppers
Solution To
Arctic Problems

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 - (AP) -
Technical problems of military
operations in Arctic areas seem to
be giving the U. S. Defence De-
partment considerable concern.

It wants, for example, some way
to erase the tracks men and vehi-
cles leave in the snow and a device
to burrow large holes in snow or
ice leaving the surface "essentially
flat for camouflage."

This was indicated today by a
list of problems made public by
the Defence Department's scient-
ist-advisers in the hope of get-
ting solutions or good ideas—from
anyone.

Of 21 technical problems com-
piled by the National Inventors
Council with the co-operation of
the armed services, at least 16
were plainly connected with mili-
tary difficulties under extreme
cold.

The Council appealed for ideas
on such problems as:

An "extra light-weight, low
ground-pressure, gasoline - oper-
ated snow-remover vehicle" usable as
"a prime mover for sleds or men
and to break trail in snow for men
equipped with snowshoes or skis."
The weight, combat loaded, should
approximate 1,000 pounds.

A device capable of burrow-
ing a large vehicle-sized hole or
