November 9th, the day of the royal visit to Prince Edward Island, was declared a civic holiday in Montague by the Town Council last night at the regular monthly meeting held in the Council Room. His Worship, Mayor B. H. Yeo, presided. Councillors present included, Nicholson, McGowan, Hessian, MacLeod, and Jamieson.

Following the reading of the minutes of the last meeting, and the disposing of general accounts, a lengthy discussion took place regarding the culverts in the town. It was felt that a previous minute had been misleading, and that the residents were under the impression that the town would replace all culverts. A motion was passed stating that all conduits in front of owners' properties would be supplied by residents at their own expense.

It was also moved that Mr. John White, town policeman, would collect all arrears on sewer taxes, and also the arrears on town taxes, and the current taxes for the year 1951. The clerk was instructed to prepare a list for this purpose.

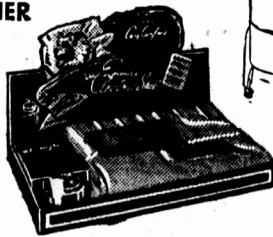
