## Strange But True

Paul Huhndorf, Chief Engineer of K P R C-TV has been receiving letters and photos from Charles Battey and Atlantic Electronics Limited of Lancaster, England.

They have picked up the call letters K L E E-TV many times in the last couple of years. They sent photographs of their T. V. screens to prove it. Could this be some joker's prank? Hardly considering that the cost of such equipment runs into hundreds of thousands of dollars. How do you suppose such signals reached as far as London anyway?

The only solution to the mystery is that these signals have been wandering in space ever since station K L E E ceased to exist.

A camera which "stops" an atom bomb explosion has been speeded up to take pictures at the rate of 15,000,000 a second. It used to take only 3,500,000.

This amazing gadget was developed by the university of California's Los Alamos scientific Lab. It is believed to be by far the world's fastest camera.

Keppoch leads the Province in the number of candidates meriting Life Saving Awards.

This Summer Resort has participated in the Red Cross Swimming and Water Safety program for the past nine years and many excellent swimmers and Life Savers have been trained here during that time.
