Local and Other Items.

THE sheep farmers in Scotland estimate their losses by the recent storms at over 100,000 head.

THE mail boats, with 32 Charlottetown bags, and 14 Summerside bags, arrived at Cape Traverse from Cape Tormentine at 12.30 today, and left for this City at 12.40.

WHILE 13 per cent. of the British income and 25 per cent of the French income is raised by direct taxation, 45 per cent. of the entire German revenue is filched from the pouch by the tax gatherer in person.

THE death is announced of Mr. Henry Corbett, for many years editor of the *Mark Lane Express*, from which journal he was compelled to retire from ill health a few years back, when he was presented with a testimonial by those with whom he had been long associated in connection with the agricultural interest.

AN English correspondent furnishes a sad picture of life in the black country in England. "The difficulty at Wolverhampton," he says, "seems to be that almost an entire population is on its last legs. As a hideous instance of the law of natural selection may be noted that the old and delicate are dying rapidly of bronchial diseases, only the more vigorous having been able to resist the combined attacks of hunger and cold upon organizations only half nourished for some considerable time past. Black care sits over the Black Country."

THE POOR HOUSE.—On the 1st of January, 1879, there were forty inmates in our Poor House. The *Argus* says: "During the year 1878, there were twenty-six persons admitted into the Institution, and eighteen discharged. The number of deaths for the same period was ten, and one was sent to the Asylum. Out of the entire number of inmates for the year there was one person over 100 years of age, ten over eighty, ten over seventy, seven over sixty, and the others under forty-five years of age. The youngest inmates are the most helpless. Three of the number are blind, one is a lunatic, and one a helpless cripple. Sergeant Allen, the efficient keeper, must have an onerous and difficult duty to perform.

WILLIAM WHITE, 14, Patrick Cavanagh, 16, and Daniel Ryan, 16, appeared before the Stipendiary Magistrate, this morning, for stealing coal from Peake Bros. & Co. Yesterday evening two of the employees of this firm fell upon the prisoners in the act of carrying off three half-bushel baskets full of coal from the yard. They succeeded in arresting the first named, and brought him to the Police Station. Shortly after, Cavanagh went to the station to ask why White was arrested. Officer McGregor, knowing he was one of the party, locked him up with White. Shortly afterwards, Ryan went to enquire about Cavanagh, and was locked up in like manner. The larceny was clearly proved against the trio, and Ryan and White were sentenced to three months' imprisonment with hard labor, and Cavanagh to four months.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

OTTAWA, Jan. 27.
Mr. Bunting has sold his interest in the Toronto *Mail* to John Rooden.
Messrs. Mackintosh & Richardson have been awarded the contract for reporting and publishing the debates in the House of Commons. Several tenders were lower than theirs. Mr. Mackintosh is our new Mayor and the editor of the Ottawa *Citizen*; and Mr. Richardson was the contractor for last session.
The Marquis and Princess will visit the convent of Notre Dame to-morrow.
A number of contractors are here in connection with the letting of the contract for the construction of 185 miles of the Canada Pacific Railway, between English River and Rat-Portage. It is said that the contract involves \$7,000,000.

LONDON, Jan. 27.
The *Pall Mall Gazette* says that the announcement of England's intention to purchase Cyprus is unfounded.
Reuters telegram semi-officially contradicts the report that Queen Victoria intends to visit Coburg and Hesse Darmstadt in the spring.
A Berlin dispatch says that Russia complains that Austria and Germany measures to prevent the spread of the plague are unnecessary and threaten to materially cripple Russian commerce.

The Trade with Great Britain in Live Stock.

The trade of Canada with Great Britain in live stock has been steadily increasing during the last few years. In 1876 our exports to England were:—

Horses	352
Fat Cattle	2,767
Sheep	6,607
Total	9,726

In 1877 they had increased as follows:—

Horses	298
Fat Cattle	6,412
Sheep	6,825
Pigs	372
Total	13,908

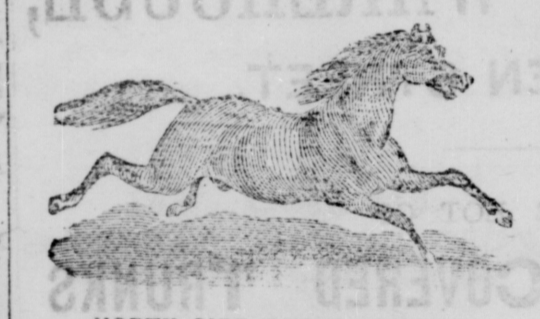
And in 1878 they had increased still further, as shown by the following figures:—

Horses	1,243
Fat Cattle	32,115
Sheep	62,461
Pigs	1,798
Total	97,617

This enormous increase has, of course, been partially due to the exceptional favors granted to the importation of Canadian cattle by the British Government. The Halifax *Herald* says it will be remembered that American cattle were for a long time subjected to some severe restrictions on account of certain cattle diseases prevalent in the United States. Canadian cattle, being entirely free from such diseases, were not subjected to these restrictions; hence, in some degree, is attributable our great success in that trade during the past year. However, it is generally believed that the trade is one in which we can profitably compete with the United States on even terms.

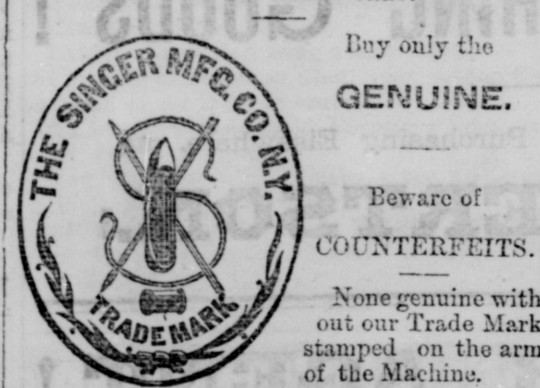
Notwithstanding trade depression the iron trade of the United States during last year shows an increase all round. The production of pig iron reached about two and a half millions of tons, of which 50 per cent. was the product of Pennsylvania. The rolling mills were more steadily employed during the past year than in the preceding. Ten out of eleven steel works were busily engaged in the production of steel rails during the entire year, and other steel works were also active. The new year opens with the promise of still more extensive and profitable business to American manufacturers.

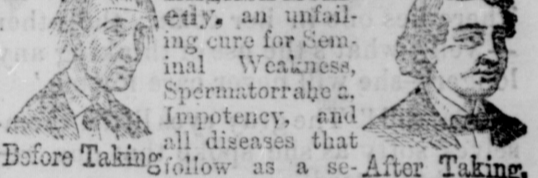
