Montague To Replace Small Street Culverts

At a special meeting of the Montague Town Council last night it was decided that all culverts under size on the main streets would be removed so as to permit a better flow of water during the time of heavy rainfall or seasonal floods. This move came as a follow-up of the recent heavy rain which caused so much damage to the streets of the town.

The meeting was presided over by His Worship, Mayor B. H. Yeo. Councillors present included Messrs. Reynolds, Nicholson and MacLeod. It was moved and seconded that Mr. John White be appointed to act as a policeman officially in conjunction with police chief, Mr. Charles MacLennan.

Discuss Fire Equipment

Considerable discussion took place regarding the fire equipment, and it was decided that the Fire Marshal would inspect the equipment regularly to see that all was in readiness for any contingency. The Marshal pointed out that it was difficult at times to get the volunteer fire brigade to attend meetings, and he expressed the hope that at the next meeting there would be a larger attendance. The Council instructed him to report back concerning the next meeting. It was also proposed that the fire brigade hold several practice sessions so as to become familiar with the equipment.

Councillor Nicholson reported that a dam would have to be constructed at the Burnt Bridge to provide a sufficient quantity of water for the pumper in case of fire in that section of the town. The Council gave him power to proceed with this project.

Councillor MacLeod stated that the streets were in very bad condition owing to the damage from the recent heavy rain. He said that the maintenance man would require additional assistance to get the streets in proper condition within a short period. The Council was informed that the culvert in the skating rink was blocked and some construction work was necessary to put it back in condition so that the water from the north part of the town would have a clear flow through the drains.

Mayor Yeo stated that in view of the recent hoist in electric rates granted to the Maritime Electric Company by the Public Utilities Board the cost of street lighting in Montague would jump to \$1400.00.

Some discussion took place regarding the condition of the town dump, and it was pointed out that it would have to be closed and a new location determined. A location on the road leading to Kilnmuir was proposed, and it was felt that a man would have to be appointed who would be on call to take the garbage to the dump. This matter was not definitely decided, and was to receive a more lengthy discussion at a later meeting.
