FRENCH EFFORTS TO EXCITE ANTI-BRITISH FEELING.

Notwithstanding the denials of the French charges that the torture of accused persons is a frequent and horrible incident of British administration in Egypt, reliable advices from that country go to confirm the French allegations. It is asserted that crucifixion and burning are not unusual methods by which natives of the lowest class are compelled to confess alleged wrongs, and there are prisoners undergoing punishment to-day whose limbs show the marks of the branding iron used to extort acknowledgments of guilt. The facts appear to be that while a pretence is made of holding trials according to European methods, the police are privately permitted to get at facts in any way they see fit, of course afterward presenting the statements in court without any mention of the fact that torture was resorted to in order to procure the pretended evidence. As great secrecy is observed in regard to what goes on in the prisons the facts have been very difficult to obtain, but there is no doubt that the French newspapers are on the right track. Of course should positive evidence be produced in court as to the use of torture, the confessions thus obtained would have to be rejected, as was done by the court of Beni Souf in the case of certain alleged brigands, who were tortured by direction of the chief of police of the province. It is stated to be a common custom of the Egyptian soldiery, who are under command of British officers, to torture dervishes whom they capture in battle. Three dervishes who were taken prisoners in a recent raid were hung up by the feet in order to compel them to confess the whereabouts and strength of the enemy. As they remained obdurate a fire was built under their heads, and they were slowly suffocated and roasted to death. As the Egyptian army is under the command of British officers, it is evident that, even if such atrocities are perpetrated without the direct authority of the British, yet the latter cannot altogether escape responsibility. There is a good deal of oppression, cruelty and wrong under the surface in British Egyptian rule, although the general condition of the native has undoubtedly been much improved.
