Clay-Liston Suspended

The World Boxing Association has stripped Cassius Clay of his world heavyweight boxing championship. The WBA has also suspended any person taking part in the promotion of the bout which Sonny Liston and Muhammad Ali have signed for with the Massachusetts Boxing Commission. The return fight is scheduled to be held on November 16 at the Boston Garden, with the heavyweight championship of the world at stake.

We feel that the WBA has made a grave mistake by making such a hasty decision on such an important matter. The stripping of Clay's title is just providing more bad publicity to the boxing game and will do further harm to the game in the public's eye.

We think the big question in the minds of the followers of the fight name is whether or not Clay's win over the 'ugly bear' was a fluke or if the 'Louisville Lip' has the necessary artillery to support his numerous blows.

Floyd Patterson is back on the thick of things due to his recent decision over Eddie Marchan. The WBA is talking of setting up an elimination tournament to decide the heavyweight championship. The top ten heavies with the exception of Liston and Clay would be competing. If Floyd Patterson won the tournament and thus the heavyweight championship of the world (and we think he would) would this leave Floyd and the boxing game? Patterson suffers two humiliations at the hands of 'Sonny Boy' and we don't feel this is the way he would want things worked out.

Through the years the WBA has been stumbling along and practically all the boxing associations of the world were a part of the organization at one time. However, if a commission wanted a fight and the WBA had an objection, the routine thing to do was to resign. After the fight and after a commission period the commission would find its way back to the WBA so it has been a game of go in and out the window over its 43 year history. It was originally called the NBA but in 1952 they changed the name to World Boxing Association. These are tough times for boxing and not the time for hotheaded decisions which go to produce an incident such as this. Such decisions destroy the public's esteem in one of man's oldest sports.

Something had to be done about the way Liston and Clay were conducting their affairs outside of the ring, but we think the action taken by the WBA only added to the confusion.

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Yankees slipped into first place in the American League Thursday night, defeating the Los Angeles Angels 6-2 behind

the pitching of Mel Stottlemyre and Roland Sheldon. The Yankees, who have won 10 of their last 13 games, moved ahead of the idle Baltimore Orioles and Chicago White Sox, who now are tied for second. It marked the first time since Aug. 6 that the Yankees held the lead. Their percentage is .563, the runners-up .501.

Veteran Golfers Dominate Action

CLEVELAND (AP)—Bill Campbell and Ed Tutwiler, two aging colts who have dominated West Virginia golf for 20 years, survived exciting overtime duels and went into the semifinals of the National Amateur Championship Thursday against a pair of scrappy colts from Texas.

Campbell, a tall Princetonian who sells insurance in Huntington, W.Va., first defeated the colorful Billie Joe Patton of Morgantown, N.C., 5 and 4 and then won a 19-hole match from Dale Morrey, former Walker Cup teammate.

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
