Hilda's Damage Reported Heavy In Oil Fields

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Hurricane Hilda's rampage through Louisiana's billion-dollar offshore oil fields was the most costly in the industry's history, a check show. Estimate of the known loss stood at \$25,000,000 after a preliminary inspection. Oilmen said here the figure could rise as they reach more of the expensive rigs which dot the Gulf of Mexico to the south of the mouth of the Mississippi River. The heavy offshore losses, just becoming apparent, raised Louisiana's damage estimates from Hilda to at least \$55,000,000. Insurance underwriters fixed the property loss, excluding oil

Gov't To Prohibit Low Quality Milk

Sale of low quality milk in the province will be prohibited in the near future, Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said Thursday. The agriculture minister said "the Dairy Products Manufacturing Act and regulations will be amended to conform to milk manufacturing standards introduced in July 1963 by the federal food and drug authorities." "The federal regulations say that 'no producer of milk shall offer for sale milk which has a bacteria count in excess of 3,000,000 per cubic centimetre, or two milligrams of sediment.' Any producer selling milk in excess of these standards will be prohibited from selling milk and no manufacturer 'shall purchase milk for manufacture or manufacture milk into dairy products if he has reason to believe it does not meet these requirements.' Mr. MacRae said that provincial dairy superintendent, Earl Adams, is bottling, by letter all milk producers and manufacturers of the proposed changes in the Dairy Products Manufacturing Act. According to Mr. Adams, "there is a gradual improvement in the quality of milk being shipped to the manufacturing plants over the last few years." "This improvement could be attributed to products becoming more quality conscious and giving more programs in effect by some of our manufacturers." "However, a considerable number of our total milk shippers still produce milk of poor quality or unacceptable milk as defined by the food and drug regulations." About 1,500 letters have been prepared for sending to producers and manufacturers. The letter contains suggestions as to how milk quality can be improved.
