SHIPPING NOTES.—Barque "Bessie Parker" is reported ashore near Shediac. It was feared, as the tide was high when she went ashore, that she had sustained some damage, but advices have been received stating that the barque came off without sustaining any serious injury.

NEW BRUNSWICK NOTES.—The hayting season has begun among the farmers. The crop will be much lighter than last year. Diphtheria, which has lately proved such a scourge in Amherst, is somewhat dying out, although a few new cases of a serious character are reported.

CAPT. WM. RICHARDS' new vessel and the bark "Olivette" sailed on Friday last for Miramichi, to be loaded with deals by A. Morrison, Esq., for Great Britain. Mr. John Richards' left on Monday's boat for above port to superintend the loading and despatch of the vessels.

The Halifax Steam Navigation Company having purchased the steamer "Sicily," she will leave London for Halifax and St. John about August 18th. The "Sicily" is 1,675 tons register with 220 horse-power engines. Through rates can be arranged from all the principal ports in Great Britain and the Continent.

The cargo of the steamer "Worcester" to Boston yesterday consisted of 1,200 cases of eggs, 350 barrels of mackerel—240 of which were shipped by B. Rogers, Esq., Alberton; 109 by H. M. Churchill, Esq., Rustico; and the balance by A. Kennedy, Esq.—200 cases of lobsters shipped by Carvell Bros., and 5 bales of hair, etc.

EVANGELIST PREACHING.—An Evangelist, sent by the Restored Apostles, will speak at the Academy of Music, Sunday evening, July 29, at 8 o'clock, on the words Acts, i:ii "This same Jesus which is taken up into heaven shall so come in like manner as ye have seen Him go into heaven." This is especially intended for all Christians.

THE Redemptorist Fathers will commence a two weeks' mission in Summerside in St. Paul's R. C. Church, on Sunday next. They have visited and held services at a large number of places on the Island. Their labors have been crowned with great success, there being no fewer than four hundred and eighteen confirmed at Souris a few days ago.

THE fourth annual regatta of the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen took place on the Ottawa River, at Ottawa on the 25th. All the races were well contested. Lang of Montreal, won the single scull amateur championship, defeating Buckley of Portland and others. The senior four-oared shell race was won by a crew from the Toronto club.

A LONDON letter of July 7th says:—"Last night there was an unusually large sprinkling of Canadians at the State ball given at Buckingham Palace by command of the Queen. Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Leonard Tilley, the Hon. Mr. Macpherson and the Hon. E. Blake were all present, as also were Ladies Tupper Tilley, Mrs. Macpherson and daughters, and Mrs. McLelan.

THE Dunk River Cheese Factory which is managed by Fenton T. Newberry, Esq., of this city, is doing a good business. During the first month of twenty-six working days, it took ninety-two and one-half tons of milk from the farmers of the district. This is probably the largest receipts of any factory in the Province, and reflects credit on the farmers of Bedouque for the support they are giving the new industry.

A CHALLENGE.—Alex. McDonald, painter of Antigonish, Nova Scotia, has the following challenge in the last Aurora:—"There is a man in Antigonish, who offers to play 1,000 tunes on any of four instruments, dance 1,000 steps, paint 1,000 life portraits, draw 1,000 patterns and sing 1,000 songs in 1,000 days, finishing one in each department every day, for six thousand dollars. I will give the world a year to get a competitor either by cash, muscle or mind."

THE Wanderers played the New Glasgow Cricket Club at Pictou yesterday. We have not yet heard the result. The Stellarton Club played the latter recently and beat them in one innings. The Wanderers played the Pictou eleven on Wednesday and defeated them with a score of 59 runs to 28. Henry, of the Wanderers, made a score of 20, the only double figures. THE total exports from Canada for the month of June amounted to \$10,173,526 and the total imports to \$9,090,651. The Inland Revenue collected was \$504,238, and the Customs receipts \$1,600,440.

CARDINAL McCABE, receiving the clergy on Sunday, condemned the false teachers who asserted that the Pope, in issuing his late circular, was exceeding his legitimate sphere of authority, or had been influenced by secular motives. Those disobeying the circular, he said, incurred the guilt of heresy.

THE friends of Rev. Thomas Cumming, late of Stellarton, N. S., will be pleased to learn that he has been appointed Moderator of the Presbytery of Montreal for the current ecclesiastical year. Mr. Cumming is well and favorably known here, he being at one time pastor of Zion Church.

THE meanest incendiary alive has been heard from. He set fire to seven ice-houses in Haverhill, Mass., night before last. As the New York Star says, the man who will fire an ice-house when the mercury is above 95 deg in the shade is capable of any wickedness, and ought to be imprisoned for life in the crater of an active volcano.

PREPARATIONS are being made in Halifax for a grand promenade concert in the public gardens on the arrival of Prince George of Wales, in H. M. S. Carada. The concert will be under the patronage of the Admiral, the General and Commander of Canada. No pains will be spared to make it one of the best entertainments of the kind ever given in the city.

A GRANDDAUGHTER of Robert Burns is, it is stated, at present in receipt of relief from the London Scottish Corporation. Her name is Mrs. Pyrke. She is the wife of a workman who has, through no fault of his own, fallen into poverty, and the daughter of the poet's eldest son Robert, who for some time was employed in Somerset House.

KILLED.—A painful accident occurred on the street of Woodstock, N. B., on Thursday last, by which a lad named Daniel H. Scott, 15 years old, was killed. An alarm of fire was given, and he, along with others, was pulling on the rope to convey the fire engine to the scene of the fire, when he fell, and the wheels of the steamer passed over his breast, killing him almost instantly.

THE meeting of Insurance Agents which took place at the office of John McEachern, Esq., last evening, was attended by the three agents from Halifax, named in yesterday's issue, and all the agents of Companies in the city. Rates of insurance were thoroughly discussed and a committee was appointed to make a tariff of rates to which all companies doing a business in the Province would agree.

BELLEVUE ALBERTITE and OIL COMPANY.—The Pictou Diamond Drill Company has their machinery now on the property of this company, at Dorchester, and will proceed at once to bore for albertite and oil. Stockholders begin already to look upon their certificates as of more value than before, and the stock will probably rise in the market at the improving prospect.—St. John Telegraph.

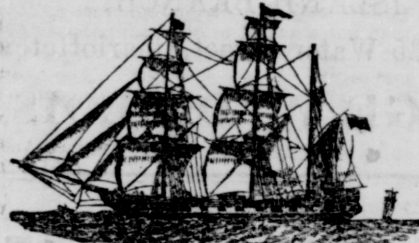
