Queen Rides At Head of Her Household Guards

LONDON, June 6—(Reuters)—London and the world wished the Queen happy birthday Thursday as she rode at the head of her household troops to take the salute from a regiment of red-coated Scots Guards at the annual Trooping the Colors ceremony.

Seated on a chestnut horse, Elizabeth headed the re-enactment of tradition while thousands of well-wishers crowded the route from Buckingham Palace to Horseguards Parade Grounds.

The Queen led her personal guards along the Mall, heralded by massed bands in golden tabards. A summer suit set off the brilliant breastplates and plumed helmets of the troopers on their jet-black steeds.

At the parade grounds, where Scots Guards had been standing at attention for hours, the Queen rode to the saluting post ahead of her uncle, the Duke of Gloucester.

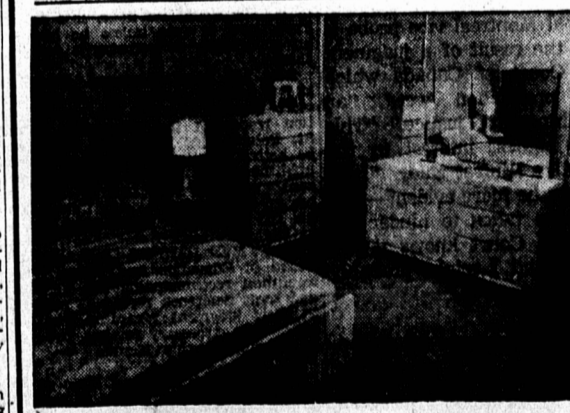

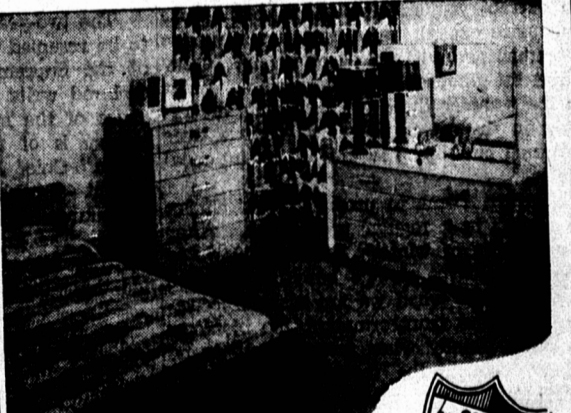
