DUBLIN, Sept. 1. He denounced the recent outrages in Ireland, and said the Land Question was the great question in Ireland.

Drowned at Shediac.

A Mysterious Double Murder.

WIPING OUT THE POLICE FORCE OF A TOWN.

A double murder was committed about 12 o'clock on the night of the 29th, at Geneva, Kane Co., Illinois, the victims being two of the three officers who constitute the police force of the town. The deed was committed near the Court House. Some dozen shots were heard by residents in the neighborhood, given in quick succession, at midnight, but no one left his bed to find the cause. A party of merry-makers returning from a picnic at one o'clock found the bodies of the murdered men, and raised alarm. Officer McNutt was found dead with a bullet hole in the region of the heart, his revolver with five chambers emptied lying near him. McNutt lay at the south-east corner of the Court House, and several rods away on the sidewalk was found officer Grant, also with a bullet hole in the breast, but on the right side. There is no clue to the perpetrators of the crime. There have been several attempted burglaries in the town of late, and it is supposed that on the night of the 29th the officers discovered the burglars at work or leaving the scene of their unlawful activity; and in the attempt to arrest them, the officers being separated, the fatal shots were fired by the thieves. Grant's pistol was found near his side, four chambers being emptied.

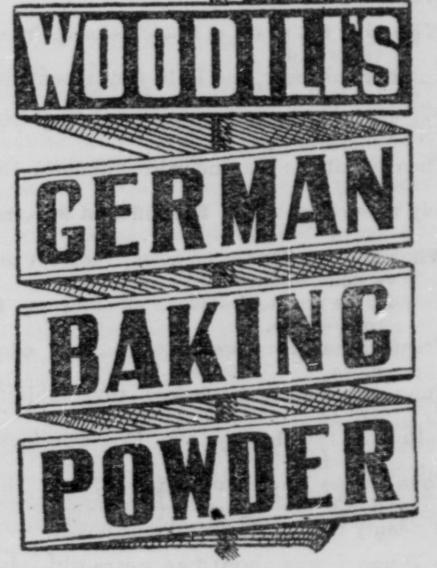
