EDUCATION IN ST. JOSEPH'S PARISH.

It has occurred to the writer by various suggestions to write for THE EXAMINER columns a brief record of education in Kelly's Cross and vicinity during the past two decades i. e., three years after the present "Act of 1877" came into force. This decision has been arrived at by the discussion of the comparative cost of education under the Conservative regime and under the Liberal one, the establishment of what have been called "political schools," and such kindred topics at the Kelly's Cross meeting on Friday night, the 30th November, and because the writer is one of those whose names appear in the following very imperfect summary of the educational status of this parish, and therefore interested in the cause. But whether this effusion shall interest any of the many readers of THE EXAMINER, is another question.

Beginning with the summer of 1879, before the present school at Kelly's Cross was built, John E. McDonald, now a skillful dentist in Summerside, Mark A. Smith, a farmer and teacher in Maplewood district, and James Kelly, the popular Queen Street grocer, were sent by their parents to Crapaud West school, then under the efficient management of the present Inspector Campbell, to obtain the education which the facilities at Kelly's Cross made it almost impossible to acquire. After walking for about twelve months to this school, a distance of four miles or more, Messrs. McDonald, Kelly and Smith succeeded in passing a very creditable examination. Their example was followed, in the desire for education at least, by the youth of Kelly's Cross district, now that a new school was opened in 1880 or 1881. This sketch is solely from memory, and may contain some trifling errors such as dates, etc., but do not detract from it considerably. The first principal in the new school was Mr. Joseph M. McDonald, now in British Columbia, who was succeeded by Mr. James Kelly, above mentioned. During their principalship many whose names I fail to remember succeeded in passing the entrance examination, among them being Mr. P. J. Trainor, the talented law student in Charlottetown. Mr. Kelly was followed by Mr. M. A. Smith, above mentioned as principal, and he by Mr. C. S. McDonald, present teacher of Rose Valley. The good results of their predecessor's efforts and of their own is now beginning to bear fruit, for during the years 1883-1888, Kelly's Cross School turned out as successful candidates the following: Rev. Dr. Monaghan, of the Cathedral; his brother, Mr. J. H. Monaghan, a successful farmer, and also teacher of South Melville District; Dr. J. B. Kelly's Cross was fortunate in having the services of Mr. D. J. Cameron, the late lamented professor in St. Dunstan's College, for the year 1888-1891, and during those years the school prospered most pleasingly. Mr. Matthias Smith, the late successful principal of Emerald School, at present a teacher in St. Dunstan's College, Mr. Maurice McDonald, at St. Dunstan's Mr. James P. Trainor, the efficient teacher at Shamrock, Misses Maggie McKenna, M. A. Malone, and Katie Monaghan were indebted to Mr. Cameron for the success they achieved when presenting themselves "to pass the board."

Although Kelly's Cross ever since its organization as a graded school, has been a successful competitor in the educational race, 'tis since its present incumbent Mr. J. H. Devereaux, took charge, 1891, that it has been particularly successful. So obvious was the improvement in its working during Supt. D. J. McLeod's annual visits, that some five years ago, it was advanced to the rank of a first class school. Mr. Devereaux is one of those practical men who do not strive to "boon" his school by "showing through" a large number of entrance candidates to the neglect of those "stay-at-home" who are not meditating a P. W. C. course, still his conscientiousness in this respect has won for him the appreciation of the taxpayers, and has likewise spread his fame as an educationist far beyond the limits of Kelly's Cross school district, as evidence the number of outside pupils who have attended the school during his principalship. Among those who have been enabled to secure a license through the labors of Mr. Devereaux, including only those within the limits of Kelly's Cross parish, are, Mr. Owen A. McDonald, (in United States), Jas D. Gorman, (deceased), George F. and Austin Bradley, two live teachers of the first class, Fred Monaghan, a prominent teacher of Green Bay, also first class, Ambrose Malore and Joseph Monaghan, at St. Dunstan's College, Walter Trainor, at Prince of Wales College, and Willie King, Kelly's Cross, and Misses Mary E. Bradley, (now a Sister in Montreal), Regina McDonald, Katie McKenna, Eugene McDonald, Janie Bradley and others whom I know I must have overlooked, as I am writing merely from memory.

If we add to the above list, Mr. Owen Kiggins, teacher at Wellington, Miss Maggie Kiggins and Miss Anastasia Smith, who passed successful examinations under the tuition of Mr Matthias Smith while in Brookvale, Lot 30, Messrs Jas D McGuigan, medical student in McGill, William Gorman (in Colorado), P. S. Bradley, a brilliant first-class teacher at Freetown, Jas F. Trainor (in New York) and Misses Teresa and Neronica Trainor, the fruits of Mr. J. H. Monaghan's labors in South Melville district, and six who have passed from Maplewood district under the charge of Mr. M. A. Smith, we shall have a total of which St Joseph's parish, Kelly's Cross may be proud. If any other place can compete with Kelly's Cross, let's hear from it.

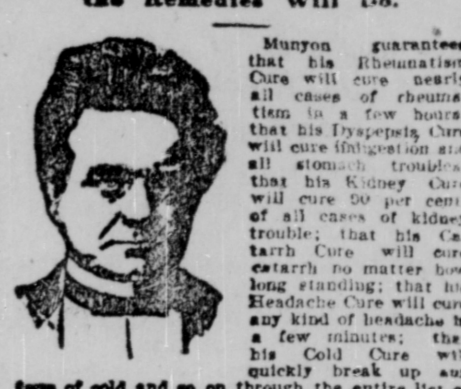

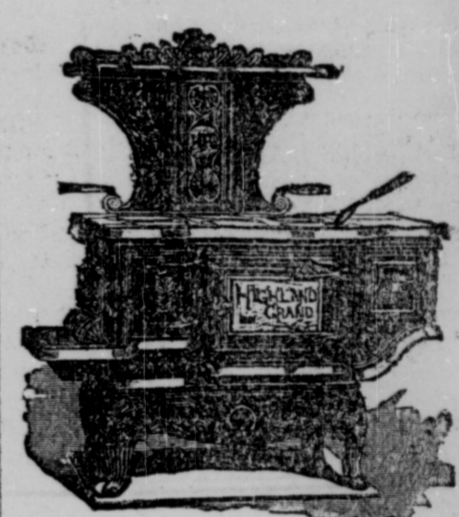
