

# SDHS Gridsters Throttle S' side

Saint Dunstan's High School gridsters began their 1965-66 interscholastic 'A' title defence on the right foot Saturday as they throttled Summerside High 45-9 Saturday afternoon. Although Summerside opened the scoring in the game at the local campus with a touchdown by David Johnson early in the first quarter, the locals completely dominated the match.

Led by the signal calling of Billy Weatherbie and running of Dennis Affleck and Sandy MacDonald the Saints stormed back to record seven unanswered TDs. Hard running MacDonald, a rookie, got things going for the Saints as he tore 10 yards through the middle to score the first of his two tallies and this counter was closely followed by Affleck's first of three scores, a twenty-five yard sweep around right end. Donnie Connors countered next for the Saints as he plunged ten yards for a major and quarterback Weatherbie sneaked over for the fourth TD of the first half. None of the

# Saints Varsity Gridsters Grab Tigers By The Tail

St. Dunstan's shocked Dalhousie Tigers with a 26 point first half behind the masterful play of the offense and a rugged defense took over in the second half, allowing only two points as the Saints whipped Dal. 25-2 in a Bluecross conference game played on Studley Field in Halifax Saturday afternoon.

Saint Dunstan's won the opening toss and choice to receive. On the first series of downs Dal recovered an SDU fumble but an interception by alert safetyman Vince Mulligan quashed one of Dal's two scoring threats in the injury filled contest. Two plays later C.Y. MacDonald ripped through a hole in the middle of the Dal line and razzed 68 yards until he was pulled down from behind by Dal's outstanding defensive end George Marcou. Three plays and two Dal penalties later MacDonald wiggled his way through about a quarter ton of Dal linemen to put the Saints on the scoreboard. Griffiths convert attempt was blocked.

Inspired with the early lead the Saints defense completely bottled up the Tigers running attack and after a series of plunges by both Griffiths and MacDonald, MacAleer went to the air with great success. Ken Hubley had a touchdown strike when he was too deep in the end zone but there was no mistake on the next play when Griffith plunged straight through the middle for his first of two touchdowns. The score was then 12-0 with less than 10 minutes gone in the game and

despite rumors that several Dal first string players were injured they suddenly appeared into the offensive. However the Saints relatively small defensive line tripped up a pair of huge Dalhouse guards and completely contained the vaunted Tiger ground game led by Bill Stanish and Paul Socock.

Helped by more Dal penalties MacAleer mixed his passing and running game beautifully and midway through the second quarter, with the wind at his back unnumbered another perfect TD pass, again to Griffith who managed to hold onto the ball in the middle of a group of Dal defensive halves. This time there was no mistake about the convert attempt and the Saints held a 19-0 lead.

Keeping to the ground in the latter part of the second quarter, the Saints fought their way down the field again behind the tremendous blocking of Rodgers, Hickey, Clarkson, Gaudet and Morton who were opposing a Dal defensive line averaging in the vicinity of 225 pounds per man. The drive was cumulated when Griffith swept to the left and barreled his way into the end zone. MacAleer elected to go to the air for the conversion attempt and this almost proved disastrous as he was badly shaken up on the play.

**DEFENSE STARS**  
The second half of the game belonged to the defense. The Saints elected to stay on the ground in a ball possession game and it proved tremendously successful for when they were forced to kick the defense managed to hold the fort.

A blocked punt in the third quarter set the Tigers up in business in the Saints end of the grid but here the defensive squad led by the hardnosed Dave Morton, Bob Driscoll, Steinburg and Connelly held the Tigers at bay. Dal had a first and ten situation on the one yard line and even failed to score from here as the rugged Saints repulsed them for three successive plays. The only Dal score of the game came in the third stanza when Barry Black tripped up Griffith behind the SDU goal line.

The Saints suffered a great many small injuries in the bitterly fought contest but according to coach Ed Hilton none were serious and all players will be set to go next weekend. Playing a polished and rough but clean brand of ball, the locals lost only 55 yards in penalties during the match while the Nova Scotians offset their total offense of 138 yards with 143 yards in penalties. The SDU gridsters had an offensive total of 250 yards along the ground and 25 in the air for a 275 yard total.

Shearwater meet the Saints at the local grid next weekend in an exhibition game and the following two weeks the locals will go against St. Mary's and St. F.X.

MacGregor. The convert attempt failed. MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Alouettes virtually assured themselves of an Eastern Football Conference playoff spot Sunday afternoon when they downed Toronto Argonauts 25-8 before less than 18,000 rain-soaked fans at McGill Stadium.

Sunday's win on a muddy field left Montreal in third place in the EFC standings with four wins in 10 starts. The Argos remained locked in the cellar with only one victory in the same number of starts.

Two Alouettes touchdowns came as the direct result of Argo fumbles, one in the opening quarter and another in the final stanza.

For Montreal, fullback J. W. Lockett enhanced his position in the Eastern scoring race with two touchdowns and 48 points, while quarterback Bernie Falconey and defensive halfback Jackie Simpson accounted for the others.

## Hill Captures US Grand Prix

WATKINS GLEN, N.Y. (AP) — England's Graham Hill won his second Grand Prix of the United States in as many years Sunday by driving his BRM to a 12.5-second victory over Dan Gurney of the U.S.

Rain and mechanical trouble with world champion Jim Clark's 32-valve Lotus kept the average speed at 107.06 miles an hour for the 253-mile race. Gurney, driving a Brabham, was one minute and 15 seconds ahead of Australia's Jack Brabham.

Lorenzo Bandini of Italy and Pedro Rodriguez of Mexico, both in Ferraris, were fourth and fifth, respectively. Jochem Rindt of Austria, in a Cooper, was sixth.

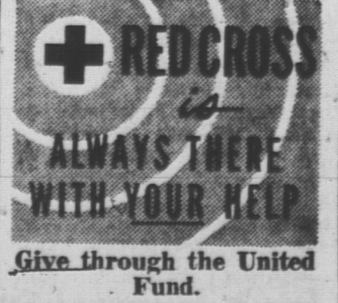
